THE APPROACHING MAJESTY.

THE PROGRAMME.

The immense "hit" of the season is expected next week. The manager of the new drama, Mr. TRENNOLM, has taken great pains in preparing the programme which he styles the "Bill of Particulars." It exhibits rare qualifications in the art of angling composition. It starts out with the idea that every man has bribed every other man and the Respondent has bribed them all. Its voluminous appearance proves wonderful histrionic ability; there being sixty pages of folio closely written, and when printed will make a book of some hundred pages. The written pages equal seventy foot line measurement, and the lines would extend about one thousand five hundred feet. The imaginary powers have been taxed severely in preparing this remarkable document. It must have required a score or two of persons to assist the manager in getting it up, and three months hard labour including nights, with an amanuensis, to complete this vast and comicalities. It will no doubt draw a large audience for nearly every man in the County is named as likely to take part in the burlesque. The manager, Mr. TRENNOLM, and the actors are no doubt flattered with the prospect of making a most popular and sparkling impression. There is a close study of originality in copying the statutes and other programmes, and such a unique system adopted that all conventional images are completely destroyed. The plot is designed to be serious in its performance without the least appearance of comic-mani; popular ballads, or gay waltzes, yet there is room left for throwing into it some amusing scenes which will sparkle with bright, crisp wit and operatic humour—that will make the flattering impression so much sought after by the actors on the stage. There is nothing common place, but all platitude. It takes the form of personal charges of the gravest character against the Respondent himself, and every crime in the calendar is charged against his supporters. Men, women and children are brought out in bold relief and charged with an average amount of swindling, cheating and political jobbery. They are to take part in the orchestra. The programme had to be lengthy; it could not be otherwise owing to the characteristics of the manager, and consequently everybody and every thing must be put into it. We are reminded, when looking over it, of the Scotchman who was told that measures were wanted, not men; to which he replied—"My candidate's a stout man and measures enough." Exactly so with this bill of particulars as regards its length, but as for men not being wanted, the idea fades; for all the men in the County are wanted, and away out of the County are gallant Knights and honorable Senators who are accused of tricks that are dark and deeds that are foul. How the play will go on we cannot say. The audience will be greatly disappointed unless the various parts are well acted, and the "hit" of the season fully realized. We have not yet heard of the issue of or price of tickets. The demand will doubtless be large. We notice that large new glass-panels are placed in front of the Court House that the crowd and teams may not damage the building. It might be well to provide a good police force also, so that order might be maintained throughout the performance which if it continues as long as the last drama put up by this same manager, and played down in Mississauga, will take some eighteen months to complete. That one resulted in no great "hit" after all, and perhaps this one will be the same; so let us not expect impossibilities from amateur actors.

The drama, of course, may take a different turn before the entire parts are acted out. An injunction has been issued to be issued against actors in performing, which being necessary to restrain them from obscene conduct and alleged defamations, and turned the play into a drama rather than a burlesque. These performers may have overstepped the bounds of legal restraint, and add themselves liable for charges of defamations, which we understand is being taken into view with a view of an action against the performers, who may find out to their sorrow that they

have no license to exhibit so obscene a performance as that which they are about to startle the world with. They have abused the courtesies of society. They have defamed the innocent. They have brought discord and strife among neighbours. They have destroyed the prospects of peace and good will in the County. They have endeavored to drive into oblivion an honorable Statesman and wise legislator whose one act during the last Session, of thwarting the Beaver Insurance Bill, has saved thousands and thousands of dollars to poor farmers and innocent traders. The whole affair is a burlesque, an episode, a farce, and before it is finished, the actors may be taught a lesson that will not be forgotten during their lives.

"KEEPING COMPANY" ON SUNDAY.

The Pastoral Address of the Archbishop of Quebec, which we publish on our fourth page, is upon a subject so important to the youth of our land, their parents and the nation at large, that we hope everybody will read it with that consideration which it deserves. The observance of the Sabbath day is shown to be the paramount duty of all, and proved from the Scriptures to be binding upon parents, masters, servants and children, so much so, that the Archbishop has ordered a special rule and commanded it to be read in all the churches, forbidding the people to take part in Sunday excursions, evening sittings, late walks, and solitary rambles which so often lead to many imprudences. The address of the Archbishop is a timely warning to all the people, Protestant and Catholic alike, and it is very gratifying to know that so high a dignitary of the Catholic Church has spoken out boldly against a sin which is growing rapidly, and to a great extent, remains unrebuked. Young people may keep company with each other and those they prefer the best, but there are times and places which are not suitable for "keeping company" and these should be guarded against as parents would guard their children against poison. Late hours and "protracted sittings" are never safe. Sunday excursions often lead to intemperance and immorality, and are never safe. "Remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy" is an injunction of the decalogue which cannot be broken with impunity. In country places and rural districts where young people are busily employed during the entire week, Sunday is often taken as a day of frivolity, and those "pleasure excursions," "solitary walks," and "protracted evening sittings" frequently take place which lead the mind to sin, and bring havoc upon many lives whose departure from the paths of virtue may afterwards be traced back to a trifling with Heaven's high law first, and thence downward to criminal weakness and disgrace. Parents cannot be too careful in the exercise of a vigilant oversight of their children, and we know nothing that will awaken them to a sense of duty in this respect, so much as a frequent perusal of the plain outspoken and faithful address of the Archbishop of Quebec. If it is attended to—there will not be so many deplorable scandals, ruined characters, youthful wrecks and corrupt influences as now so often meet us and over which the country mourns. The principal base of christian morality is the observance of the Sabbath. Its faithful observance indicates a lively faith in the Creator and Redeemer of the world, and by that faith men are led to recognize the necessity of observing the Divine law and living an honorable, virtuous life. Where there is no observance of the Sabbath, there is generally a looseness of principles regarding morality, and all those high, noble, and manly characteristics which ennoble life and make it happy and useful.

Lachute and the Natural History Society of Montreal.

The Montreal *Witness* had an article the other day on Lachute as a place where the Natural History Society of Montreal intended to spend their annual field day. We shall be glad to welcome the Society to this romantic and beautiful place. We are somewhat amused at the description the *Witness* gives of this village. It describes Lachute as having 125 houses, 5 churches and 4 hotels, and is represented in the Dominion Parliament by the Hon. J. C. ABBOTT. It says the village lies between the railway track and the North River and the river is crossed by two bridges, one at the east end, the other at the west end, being about a mile from each other. This is the description of Lachute as given in the *Witness*. According to this: Lachute ends with Barron's Bridge. Fish's Bridge, the two beautiful Railway Bridges, the West River Bridge, Allen's Hotel, the Mills, the Mill Dams, the Falls, the Mineral Springs, together with some sixty dwelling houses, with beautiful gardens, river edge walks, and robins, larks, and wild canaries as plentiful, as that shown in the *Witness* description, but we have not got the mocking bird in this undescribed part of Lachute. No! unfortunately we have not the mocking bird. But we have plenty of specimens for the botanists, the florists, the geologists and mineralogists to

work on, and if any of them wish to analyze the mineral spring water they may be surprised to find in it valuable deposits of sulphate of soda, sulphate of magnesia, sulphate of lime and oxide of iron. We would advise the writer of the article in the *Witness* to visit these springs, to drive through the beautiful groves along the river edge in that part of Lachute to which he appears never to have seen or heard of. He will also see that the village does not all lie between the North River and the Railway track. There are some of the most beautiful residences and grandest natural scenery to be found anywhere on the banks of the river West of the boundary given as a directory for the members of the Natural History Society and their friends in visiting Lachute.

The Quebec Session.

Whether the representative from this county will support Mr. CHAPLEAU upon the opening of the Quebec Legislature today, or no, is a subject for some debate. It is generally expected that the Government will have a working majority and that a general policy will be adopted in keeping with the already expressed views of those at the head of affairs. There will be reference made no doubt to the loan recently effected, and the improvements regarding education, agriculture, mining and the administration of justice will be introduced. Whatever may be in the speech from the Throne, we may expect it to be carried out, and not a following of that vacillating course pursued by the late Joly Administration, which made them so ignoble in the eyes of the country.

To the Editor of THE WATCHMAN: Sir,—In connection with the Hanlan-Courtney Race, a thought suggests itself for our reflection as Canadians. Our cousins over the border have many virtues of their own, as well as virtues inherited. But they have vices indigenous to the Republic, which it ought to be our aim to avoid—one of which has presented itself forcibly on the Potomac. I allude to the duplicity, trickery and deception with which all public events are surrounded; where the mean cunning of the proverbial "Yankee" trickster enters into the very national recreations. I do not think there is any parallel to this in England or Canada. Men get fair-play as a rule in our British Dominions. They get it as an exception over the lines, and this spirit does not stop there. It enters into business and professional life, and men deal with their neighbours as if every one was a rogue. No doubt the demoralizing tendency of American politics has much to answer for the corruption of the very sports. We have our vices too in Canada: but it is not a Canadian trait to gush over a champion when he wins and desert him when he fails. It is not a Canadian trait to play the bragart; to threaten a man's life because he is beaten by a better one. Hanlan's modesty and quiet courage is a good example for Canadians to follow. Respectable Americans are glad to have here: but Yankee schemers and gamblers are better in company with the quack doctors and dentists of the Bowery.

OUR OTTAWA LETTER.

(From an occasional Correspondent.)
OTTAWA, May 27, 1880.

To the Editor of THE WATCHMAN.

Sir,—On Friday last I wrote Grenville of this city, arrested one Jean Baptiste Fortin, of this city on a charge of having taken into himself four wives. The accused is a tall spare man, with anything but an attractive appearance. When brought before the Magistrate he stated that he had nothing to say for himself and that for all he cared the woman he had married, appeared in court and gave evidence. They were Annie Domoilin, and Mary McNamara, wives No. 3 and 4 respectively. Fortin married a woman named Chartand, 20 years ago. He next married one Philomena Gingras, a resident of St. Anne de Baupre. Four years ago he took unto himself Miss Danoulen, by whom he has a daughter of 4 years. The last, but not by any means the least as to size, Mrs. Mary McNamara, he married on the 6th of April last. A strange thing in connection with the case, is that all of the wives have requested that Fortin should be released as he was such a good kind husband. He has been fully committed for trial at the Assizes in June next.

Drunkness is unfortunately on the increase in this city at present, and the majority of the cases brought before the Police Magistrate for settlement are attributable to it. The Herald of this city was on Saturday last sold out by a clique, hired it said by certain disreputable characters in connection with newspapers of this city, who thought thereby to close it up and thus prevent their doings (discreditable at the best) from being exposed. However in this they failed, although they sold out the old plant, for friends came to the rescue and purchased an entirely new one, and the paper was issued yesterday in its new form and looked indeed well.

Sir John A. Macdonald left for Toronto last night, it is said on business in connection with the Government. Mr. Lalaboth's party of surveyors left for Winnipeg on Wednesday night. They will be engaged in township surveying. On the Queen's birthday all the places of business in Ottawa were closed. The celebration this year was very tame to those of former years, the whole consist-

ing of four picnics, a number of excursions from the city and the firing of the usual royal salute from the Nepean Point Battery.

Prince Leopold will visit this city on Friday next.

Mr. B. Rosamond of Almonte was in Ottawa yesterday on his way to England, where he is going to purchase machinery for a new worsted factory he purposes starting at Almonte.

The Hull Fire Relief Fund now amounts to \$19,330.44, out of which \$6,568.50 has been expended in the construction of new buildings.

A new arrangement has been entered into between the American and Canadian postal authorities by which the exchange of money orders between the two countries has been much simplified and the cost reduced. The system is similar to the new arrangement in England.

The arbitration in the claims against the Government for timber dues improperly exacted more than a quarter of a century ago, has been concluded and Senator Glazier's claim will, it is understood be paid. The amount involved is about \$20,000 with interest for 25 years.

There is but one case of small pox at present in the Protestant Hospital. A large number of cases of measles are reported in the city and district.

C. E. SIKKOS.

Newfoundland has determined to build a Railway 350 miles North and West of St. John. It will be the narrow 3 feet 6 inch gauge, and they expect to complete it for \$12,000 per mile, only a little more than the estimated cost of the Prairie section of the Canada Pacific. The road will have a great effect in developing Newfoundland, but the estimate seems much too low. In fact it reads somewhat like the original prospectus of the Grand Trunk, which proved most satisfactorily, that at a most moderate estimate the ordinary stock holders were certain to get at least eleven per cent on their money.

PRINCE LEOPOLD'S ARRIVAL.—Prince Leopold arrived at Quebec, on the 23rd inst., by the "Sardinian." He was attended by Col. McNeill, V.C., Esquary of the Queen; Hon. A. York, R. H. Collins, Dr. Boyle and Lord Elphinstone. His Royal Highness had an excellent passage, was perfectly well the whole way and enjoyed himself much. When the steamship rounded the Point, Princess Louise and the Governor General, attended by Col. De Winton, drove down from the Citadel escorted by a detachment of the Queen's Own Canadian Hussars to the Queen's wharf, where B. battery was drawn up as a guard of honor, with a band, under Col. Montezumbert. The staff present on the wharf was Gen. Sir Edward Selby Smythe, Colonel Duchesnay, D.A.G.; Col. Strange, commandant; Capt. Smith Major Forrest, Col. Colter and others. The Governor General and the Princess Louise embarked on the steam yacht "Dolphin" and boarded the "Sardinian," being received at the gangway by Capt. Dutton. On meeting the Prince, Her Royal Highness kissed him fondly. The united party crossed back in the steam yacht to Quebec, where a royal salute was fired, after which they drove direct to the Citadel. The Lieut. Governor and some of his ministers, also the Mayor and Councilors, were present on the wharf, but no reception or presentation took place other than that the Princess Louise introduced the Lieutenant Governor formally to Prince Leopold.

THE GERMAN CROWN PRINCE'S FAMILY.—I have reason to believe that the rumored betrothal of Prince William, the eldest son of the Crown Prince of Germany, to Princess Augustus Victoria, daughter of the late duke of Augustenberg, may now be considered as a fact. It has been received very quietly here, as it appears that the bigwig at court would have preferred to see Prince William allied to one of the reigning families of Europe. The prince was born in 1859, and is consequently 21 years of age. His future bride is some three months his senior. Prince William, like the Crown Prince of Austria, has been guided in his choice exclusively by the dictates of his own heart; that is to say, he is making a love match. This is but the very natural consequence of the admirable education given to the children of the Crown Prince and Princess of Germany. There is not a more united nor a happier household than theirs throughout the empire. The attachment for each other is proverbial in every German home. Their children have been brought up on sound English principles, and always encouraged in simplicity of taste and genuineness of character.

One of the local papers in Stormont is responsible for the following:—Patullo, the chief organizer of the Grit party visited Stormont to help on his party's defeat. George Brown says Patullo is a valuable man; probably he is. The people of Stormont maintain that he was more valuable on the journey down than he was on the return trip, judging by what he left behind him. He met Mr. Kerr, M.P.P., at a railway depot and said, "Mr. Kerr, before I came down here, I feared you would beat us, but now I feel that our victory is assured." "No doubt Mr. Patullo," was Mr. Kerr's quick reply, "You brought down in your pockets, thousands of reasons why I should be defeated; but never mind; I told the boys not to be bashful about taking your money. It would do them good and they could vote for me all the same." The crowd fairly roared.

After the death of his wife a husband, who seems not to have been over-succumbed in the use of language, called on the doctor to express his obligation for services during the illness. 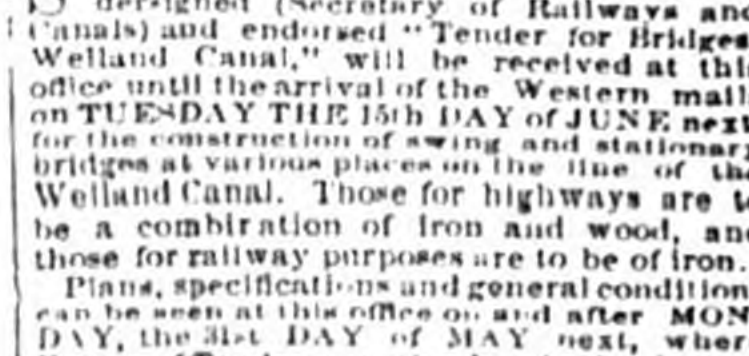

LAYING THE CORNER STONE OF

TRURO CATHEDRAL.

A Masonic Pageant.

THE PRINCE OF WALES GRAND MASTER

OF CEREMONIES.

LONDON, May 22, 1880.

Certainly the most interesting event
of the week was the laying of the founda-
tion stone of Truro Cathedral by the
Prince of Wales, whose title, the Duke
of Cornwall, made his invitation to and
presence at the ceremony peculiarly ap-
propriate. The event was made still
more interesting from the fact that this
is the first cathedral erected in England
since the Reformation. The ceremony
was unusually splendid. The chief
features were the grand Masonic rites
—the Prince being Grand Master of
England—the princely state and religi-
ous rites, which, with almost barbaric
pompe and glitter, marked every phase
of the proceedings. Brilliant weather
added lustre to the scene. Truro was
decorated with flags and triumphal
arches with Masonic and loyal mottoes.
The Prince, wearing his Masonic robes
of purple, heavy with gold embroidery,
was received at the Royal Pavilion by
the Bishop and clergy clad in their
white surplices and scarlet academic
hoods. The members of the Grand
Lodge, in their Masonic dresses of
crimson, blue, green and purple, with
gold chains and enamelled jewels, flank-
ed the pavilion. Behind them were
the white-robed choir and choral Phil-
harmonic societies.

The Princess of Wales was dressed
in light sage green and gold. Her two
sons, who wore the uniforms of naval

cadets, stood in advance of the general
line. Officers in uniforms of scarlet
and gold; ladies in brilliant toilets;
civic dignitaries in their official robes
made the scene one of striking splen-
dour. As the trumpets sounded the
first notes of the national anthem the
cannon roared in rhythm. The Prince
then advanced to lay the foundation
stone and delivered the following speech
to the assembled Masons:—

THE PRINCE'S MASONIC SPEECH.

BROTHERS:—We are an ancient
fraternity, which from the earliest days
has been identified with all that is
beautiful and grand in architecture.
You will, therefore, be proud to have
aided me, as I have been proud to work
with you, in commencing a building
which by the beauty of its design and
solidity of its construction will, we trust,
be an ornament to this city and prove a
benefit to posterity. But, brothers, it
is something far more than this. It
is a temple to be erected to the glory
and worship of our Heavenly Father
—the great Architect and Creator of all
things. And, whatever minor differ-
ences may be among us I feel sure that
the same spirit moves in your minds
this day which animated the Jews of
old, when, as Ezra tells us, the builders
laid the foundation of the temple of the
Lord and they set the priests in their
apparel with trumpets to praise
the Lord, after the ordinance of David,
King of Israel. And it is the same
spirit which is now inspiring you to-
gether in praising and giving thanks to
the Lord, because the foundations of the
House of the Lord were laid.
Then, addressing the Bishop, His
Royal Highness said:—

My Lord Archbishop, BRETHREN
AND FRIENDS:—It is known to you
that we are lawful Masons, true and
faithful to the laws of our country.

Masons not ourselves operative
Masons we have from time immemorial
been associated with buildings to be
raised for the benefit of mankind, the
adornment of the world and the glory
of the Great Architect of the Universe.

We have among us secrets concealed
from those who are not Masons, but
they are lawful and honorable, and
not opposed to the laws of God or man.

They were entrusted to Masons in
ancient times, and, having been faith-
fully transmitted to us, it is our duty
to convey them inviolate to our pos-
terity. We are assembled here today
in the presence of you all to erect a
house for the worship of the Prince of
the Most High, which we pray that
God may prosper as it seems good to
Him.

EMBLEMS AND FORMULAS.

The Prince then called upon the
Grand Secretary to read the inscription
on the plate over the cavity stone:—

OF THE CATHEDRAL CHURCH OF
ST. MARY OF FAIR
ERECTED BY THE
MASONIC SOCIETY OF
CORNWALL, K. C.

MOST WORTHY HONOURABLE MASTER
OF THE R. E. A. M. OF ENGLAND,
22ND MAY, 1880.

The Grand Treasurer then deposited
a bottle containing coins and a copy of
the Order in Council creating the Se-
nior of Truro. The Earl of Mount Ed-
mund then handed the Prince a silver
trowel bearing the several arms of the
Grand Lodge, of the country, of the
Bishop and of the city and of the
Prince. A smooth master stone was
lowered and the Prince applied the
plumb and rule, saying:—

"I find this stone to be plumb and
true and that the craftsmen have prepared
it true and true."

Then he proved it by the level,
saying:—

"I find the stone level and that the
craftsmen have labored skillfully."

Then he proved it by the square,
saying:—

"I find the stone plumb, level and
square, and declare it duly prepared,
true laid, and that the craftsmen have
worked well."

DEDICATION OF THE STONE.
The Prince then struck the stone
three times with the mallet. He scat-
tered corn from a golden cornucopia,
saying:—

"I scatter corn upon the stone as an
emblem of plenty and abundance, God's
best gift. May they be good seeds of
His words, sown here in the hearts of
men, take root and bring forth fruit,
a hundred fold to their benefit and His
glory. So mote it be."

Then, pouring wine from a golden
chalice, he said:—

"I pour out wine upon this stone as
the symbol of strength and gladness.
May those who work upon the build-
ing and those who shall hereafter meet
within its walls ever perform their al-
lotted part in the service of the Great
Architect with cheerfulness and single-
ness of heart. So mote it be."

Then, pouring oil from a golden vase,
he said:—

"I sprinkle this stone with oil as an
emblem of peace and harmony. May
good will and brotherly love ever pre-
vail among those who shall worship in
this house to the glory of the Most
High, until time shall be no more. So
mote it be."

The Prince then received purses
from the ladies, containing not less than
five pounds sterling. Each of the pre-
sentation purses carried with it the
honor of an introduction to the Princess,
and consequently the subscriptions were
heavy.

PRUSSIA AND THE VATICAN.—The
Cologne-Gazette's Rome correspondent
asserts that Cardinal Jacobini has been
instructed by the Curia to inform Prus-
sia that the Pope disapproves of the per-
missive system in the bill amending the
May laws, and withdraws the concession
made in the brief to the Archbishop of
Cologne regarding notification to be
made to the Prussian government of the
appointment of priests, declaring it void.

A SUGGESTION.—It is suggested by
the London Times that each ocean
steamer might carry two steam launches
instead of the ordinary ship's boats.
The suggestion is well worthy of seri-
ous consideration.
