TEACHERS' INSTITUTE.

It is of great value to those teachers who are about to receive their diplomas for the first time, because the grade of the diploma depends on attending and answering the questions on the institute work to be forwarded later. Let as many teachers, then as take an interest in Educational work, make it a point to be present and not only encourage the enterprise but receive additional help to perform their daily duties.

We would also beg our citizens to show more cordial welcome to the teachers and lecturers, which they did two years ago. Much of the success of the meetings depends on the sympathy shown by the friends of education in the community. All who can attend, say, or send the good days lecture, will be welcomed. For the work to be taken up in the institute see the programme of the institute work in this issue. All the teachers' accommodation should be made in their homes to J. W. McDougall.

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THE PERMANENT BUILDINGS.

The Agricultural Society have taken an important and progressive step in deciding to erect and select a site for permanent buildings in which to hold their annual exhibitions. The society can never prosper to a desirable degree unless it has some abiding place, where articles put on exhibition are not in danger of being destroyed by the weather. We expect to see the society grow more rapidly by one hundred per cent than it has done in former years. As to the selection of a site, it is done, and whoope the members of the society will have the good sense to work together and allow no outside influence to cause strife or dissension.

There is only one question upon which there should be no doubt, viz. the charge made in Mr. McKay's protest. Did the directors decide that only new members should vote? There is nothing to show on their minutes books that they did. Even if they did, we question their right to do so. When an individual pays \$1 and becomes a member of the society, he is entitled to all its privileges and the directors have no power to decide who of its members shall vote. Legally no such understanding was come to by the directors. But was there any understanding verbally, as between gentlemen, that only old members should vote? We think not, or rather the majority of the directors say not. It is hard to see such an understanding as we should be the first to protest against new members being taken simply to vote. We have always maintained that the building should be situated in the place most suitable to the active members, or prospective active members of the society, and for any particular section to make members, who have no interest in the society, but whose vote counts equally with those who exhibit largely, is decidedly improper. In the vote of Tuesday, however, the large majority of the old members voted in favor of the Cruise site, therefore no injustice has been done even although new members did vote.

ABUSES IN ARGENTVILLE.

The Mercer government stand today, the most notorious example of a corrupt government ever known in the history of Canada. The Mercer government, the expenditure they opposed the commercial tax, they promised the abolition of the Legislative Council, they preached economy, when out of power. But when in power we find the expenditure has increased, the commercial tax has been made more burdensome, \$500,000 of the people's money has been corruptly handed over to a society, which should have no legal status, the Legislative Council is still in existence, and the most despicable means have been resorted to, for the purpose of securing a majority in that body. Coming to our own county we find scandalous abuses right under our own eyes, and had not our member taken the pains and produced proof positive before the house, we question if the public would ever have known the extravagance of the government in reference to this county. The Mercer government voted \$10,000 for colonization purposes in Argenteuil. During the last session of Parliament, Mr. Owens presented twenty four petitions from the county for colonization roads and bridges, and he urged them upon the government. Now while the government is so ready to spend money as it suits them, as a matter of principle, they should at least give some attention to the desires of the people. This money was placed in the hands of a private individual and as a result was spent on a road which can scarcely be called a colonization road. But the most interesting part of the whole affair is the recklessness and corrupt manner in which this money was distributed.

From the return presented to the house, it appears that it is seen that \$10,000 only was spent in the county during the 1887-88 session. This was expended in various different ways, and the money was paid for their services.

prices, \$50,777 leaving the sum of \$500 actually spent in labor on the roads in question. But Carr. Kiewit was paid as inspector of colonization the sum of \$91,777 paid to superintend an expenditure of \$500. Mr. Mercer admitted that no official report had been sent in by Carr. Kiewit, but that a private one had been made which implicated several prominent men. Mr. Owens challenged Mr. Mercer to produce the report before the house, but the premier backed down.

PERMANENT BUILDINGS.

Buildings to be erected in Lachute on the farm of Mr. P. Cruise.

The public meeting called for the purpose of selecting a site for the permanent buildings of the Agricultural Society was held in the Council room, Lachute, on Tuesday afternoon last. Mr. Geo. Morrison, President, occupied the chair. After the chairman announced the object of the meeting, the Secretary, Mr. G. J. Walker, read the notice calling the meeting and the reports made as follows:

There were in all five offers, as follows: Mr. Simpson, of St. Andrews, offered five acres of land gratuitously, Mr. Davis, of St. Andrews, also offered five acres of land on his farm gratuitously. Besides this, the people of St. Andrews offered \$500 as a subscription if the buildings were erected in St. Andrews.

Mr. Hugh Fraser, of Lachute, offered five acres of land at \$500 per acre, or in all \$1,750. The people of Lachute subscribed \$500 if the buildings were placed on Fraser's site.

Mr. Peter Cruise offered five acres of land at \$100 per acre, in all \$500. The citizens of Lachute subscribed \$500 if the buildings were erected on the Cruise site.

Mr. McKay offered \$50 and nothing said about the site.

A recapitulation of the offers resulted as follows: St. Andrews on either site land and \$500; Cruise at Lachute, a donation of \$500; Fraser's land and \$500. It will be seen that in reference to money advanced, St. Andrews made the best offer.

Mr. Martin moved, seconded by Mr. Lane, that this meeting do not select the site but vote on the question as to whether the buildings should be erected at Lachute or St. Andrews.

Mr. McKay thought the motion was not legal as we were met here to select the site at Lachute could not be a site. There are four sites before the meeting and it would be in order to move the adoption of one of them.

Mr. Center said the question was not so much the cost of the site as the selection of a place most central and most convenient to the majority of the members of the society. These buildings were for the future and it would be nonsense for the sake of a few hundred dollars to place the buildings at one end of the county. At this point the meeting became confused and disorderly, three or four speaking at once. Mr. Martin withdrew his motion and Mr. Barron moved that in the opinion of this meeting the town of Lachute is the most central and most convenient place, on which to erect permanent buildings in which future exhibitions of the society shall be held.

Mr. McKay moved an amendment that the site on Davis' property in St. Andrews be adopted. Speaking in his motion Mr. McKay laid before the meeting the claims and advantages of St. Andrews.

Mr. Barron spoke in favor of his motion at some length.

Again considerable confusion and loud talk occurred and nothing could be heard. Meantime Mr. Martin's motion was again placed as the main motion and Mr. Barron's was declared to be an amendment, and Mr. McKay's an amendment to the amendment. After some further discussion, which was of very little moment, Mr. Martin again withdrew his motion and Mr. Barron claimed that his motion should be the main motion. Mr. Barron objected and declared that when the main motion was withdrawn, the amendment fell to the ground, and moved as a main motion that the site offered by Peter Cruise in the town of Lachute be accepted. Mr. Barron insisted that his motion was made after Mr. Martin's was withdrawn, and that he should be the main motion. The chair ruled that Mr. Barron's was the main motion. Mr. McKay then moved in amendment that the Davis property in St. Andrews be selected. The voting then commenced and resulted as follows:

Against the amendment 104
For " " 17

Majority against St. Andrews 87
The main motion was then put and carried.

Mr. McKay filed a formal protest against the proceedings on the grounds that at a meeting of the Directors it was decided that no new member should be allowed to vote, and that new members had voted. He said that he himself had refused money from several persons who wanted to join, and asked Mr. Martin if he had not done so also.

Mr. Martin: If any person offered me a dollar for membership fee I always took it.

Mr. McKay: But you told them they could not vote.

Mr. Martin: No I did not. They never asked me about voting and I said nothing about it.

After quiet was restored the meeting adjourned with some little friction. The Directors immediately held a meeting afterwards and decided to submit the site chosen for the approval of the County Council.

MAGISTRATES' COURT.

PRESENT: T. Barron Esq. and R. McGregor Esq.

AYRER vs. BANNEMAN.—This was an action instituted by Mr. Ayer of Hamelin vs. Ayer, asking the court to compel Bannerman to give security for obedience of the peace, as the plaintiff believed that he and his men are in bodily danger of an injury by the defendant.

Mr. McKay appeared for the plaintiff. Mr. Palliser for defendant.

Mr. Ayer, being sworn stated that he had engaged men to work on an island to remove some logs belonging to the firm of Hamelin & Ayer. One of the men returned and told him, Mr. Bannerman had threatened to shoot them if they touched the logs. Mr. Ayer went back with the men and asked Bannerman why he had stopped them. He replied that the logs were his and forbid us taking them. He took out his revolver and pointed it at the witness and said, "I will shoot you and I will shoot him who has shot my lumber." A man went out his hand on Bannerman's shoulder and said, "you know you will be hanged if you shoot any person." Bannerman said, "I don't care I will shoot him like a dog." The witness bargained for the

lumber from Mr. Cruise. To my knowledge Cruise has been in possession of the island for over ten years and is still my only reason for making this deposition is fear of bodily injury to myself and men.

CROSS EXAMINATION.
Bannerman purchased his mill site from Mr. Cruise. He owns the land up to the river to Fish's line. I have never seen the river. The island is nearest Ireland's shore. I cut over a dozen trees. The defendant was on the island when I went back. I ordered the men to roll the logs into the river.

BANNEMAN was employed on Monday last by Mr. Ayer to roll logs into the river at the island in question. When I went to work Bannerman came and stopped me, saying that the logs belonged to him and not to touch them. He took out his revolver and put it six feet from the head of one Deslaurier. Told Bannerman to take some other way than to let the men take the logs and asked him why he stopped the men. Bannerman said "the island and timber belonged to him." He took out his revolver cocked it and said he would shoot any person who touched it. I said "you will be hanged if you shoot any person." Bannerman said "I don't care I will shoot them like a dog." We then left.

P. Cruise.—Have been in peaceable possession of the island for twenty years, bought it from Mr. Matthews who had been in possession for thirty years, never sold it, gave Hamelin liberty to take of some timber but put no price on it, although he expected to get paid. Sold all the land and water power from Bannerman's farm to Fish's line. The island is nearest Bannerman's side.

For the defence Mr. Thomas Bannerman was examined, we own the island since June 1880 and have held peaceable possession ever since. There is no reserve in the deed for these islands and we understand they were ours. The purchase was made by the late H. Bannerman.

—BELLANGER.—Swore that he was cutting trees on the island by instructions from Mr. Ayer and was stopped by Mr. Bannerman. Would have cut them if he had not stopped us.

JOHN CLARK.—Went with Bannerman to the island on Monday last. Hamelin's men were there for the purpose of taking the logs. Ayer told the men to roll the logs to the river. Bannerman said he would shoot the first man who touched them. Saw a revolver in Bannerman's hand. Bannerman said he would shoot the first man that would touch the timber. Swore positively that he did not say "like a dog" never saw Bannerman in possession of a revolver except that time. The defendant was bound over to keep the peace for 6 months in the sum of \$200.

THE HEATHEN.

On Monday night last a very interesting address was given in the Baptist Church by Miss Frith, a lady missionary who has spent five years among the Tolegas of India. Rev. Mr. Higgins occupied the chair and the Rev. Mr. Higgins introduced the lady to the congregation. Miss Frith commenced by giving an account of her call to the work of Foreign Missions. It had not been a question of a moment, but had been the dearest wish of her heart for many years. When in Montreal, an opportunity was offered to her, elected by the Missionary Board to India. The sufferings of missionaries in India were varied, the most common cause was the heat of the climate which gave rise to continual fevers, but notwithstanding these difficulties she enjoyed her life there, because she felt she was engaged in God's work. The mission passed through its darkest hours, during her stay in India. She was there when the great old soldier of Christ, Mr. T. J. Stewart, was called to his reward. This calamity caused a feeling of gloom and sadness to rest over all his co-workers. She was also present and helped to nurse Mr. Currie, who had been laid up, and when many others were sick at the same time. Then her own health broke down and she was compelled to return home. Even then she had never regretted the step she had taken. Upon arriving in the country she was welcomed by the cordial and cheerful people. At first sight they seemed hideous, their language was peculiar and difficult. Upon leaving the steamer a friend said to her "don't be too sanguine." However she felt more sanguine than before, for some time than before her arrival. The gentlemen missionaries in India, work among the villages on the canals and rivers in the country. In many such places the gospel has been preached for years, the seed has been sown, consequently the results are more visible than among the women. The lady missionaries work among those who have never heard and are entirely ignorant of the gospel. Some of these women are very intelligent, others are of the lowest class, some are intelligent and are quite intelligent. She had been told that if she went among the dancing girls, she would not be admitted to other and higher classes of society, but she felt that where the people would have her go, and strange to say not many doors had been closed on that score. The language was learned from Brahmin teachers called a "Moonobee." These are an English Baptist Church, whose members are composed of class, which might be called half-bred, being half English and half native. There are many castes or classes in India, none of which will associate with each other. If a Brahmin knew that his clothes had been touched by a white person he would wash them before wearing them again. In Ceylon there are many highly educated young men. Miss Frith here gave a history of four of these young men two of whom died believing in Christ, the other two were not yet converted. The houses in India are built with many little rooms arranged around a central courtyard. These rooms are roofed but the courtyard is not, and the sun and rain beats in upon it. The surroundings from the rooms are thrown into the courtyard. The front rooms next to the road are occupied by the men. They are fitted up very comfortably with easy chairs, red carpets, etc. The rear of the house is not so comfortable, in fact they are good enough for them. The provision used for a woman is "it." They do not eat with their husbands, but they must wait upon their husbands, and they are allowed to pick up the fragments of the husband's food. The great many questions, one of which how many respect is the missionary's salary. A man is respected in proportion to the amount of his salary. A wife is equal to 6 cents. Quite a number of the women became Christians. There are over 150,000,000 of people in India worshipping 333,000,000 gods. A Canadian can scarcely imagine the density of India's population. In a semi-circle measuring 10 miles there are 100 cities, towns and villages. There is no such thing as these people to be saved except the way in which we have been saved. We have the light, they have not. If the light is not sent to them, we are responsible. My wife and the knowledge of Christ to these women and children, I will shoot you and I will shoot him who has shot my lumber." KEEP THE SCHOOLS OPEN.

A very important point was touched upon in Mr. Rexford's lecture in reference to the distribution by School Commissioners of the funds of the municipality. Among the various school districts which are under the control of the different boards of School Commissioners there are several, which only enjoy the privilege of a school four months in the year. The reason is that the number of tax-payers in the district is small, and is made up of very poor people, who are unable to keep a teacher more than that length of time. The mistaken idea has gone about, that it is the school district and the school managers hire and pay the teacher. It should be borne in mind that the school commissioners hire and pay the teachers, and by law may be compelled to provide and pay a teacher for every school in the municipality during 8 months of the year, be it poor or rich. A most vicious, unfair and illegal practice exists in some municipalities, of dividing up the school funds among the various districts according to the amount of taxes paid into the common fund by such district. In other words the district, draws out of the common fund the taxes which it has paid in. In every school municipality where that system prevails, any ratepayer may refuse to pay his taxes and the law will support him in doing so. The legal method of distributing the money is according to the number of children in each district. The amount paid in by each district has nothing to do with it. No district may contain many wealthy farmers, and pay in four dollars of taxes for every dollar paid by No. 2. But if No. 2 has four times as many children in school as No. 1, the former should draw four times as much money. Every good school district should insist that they receive their rightful share of money and have a school during 8 months in the year.

PUBLIC SPIRIT.

What Lachute needs is a little public spirit, that will lead her citizens to take an interest in the welfare and progress of the town as a whole. Selfishness leads even to spend all their time and energy in promoting their own interest. Our young people are growing up with very little educational culture. Evenings are frittered away in very childish and useless amusements. No opportunity can be obtained to read the current literature of the day, unless each individual can afford to subscribe, to do which few have either the means or the inclination. To cultivate in their children a taste for good reading should be a desire on the part of all parents. To know that their boys are in a reading room or library society, instead of running up and down the streets or frequenting bar rooms, should be a source of comfort to parents. Children have a great desire to do what they like, and that desire generally remains a motive power during their whole life. If, therefore, they could only be made to like what is right and good, they would always be right. A public library and a reading room connected with a literary society and separated from all denominational influences, would prove beneficial to the moral and intellectual status of our community. Sports should always occupy a fair proportion of a boy's leisure hours, but he cannot afford to spend all his time in that way. A man is not a man unless he has developed the three sides of his being, the physical, the moral and the intellectual.

ARMENIA OR THE LAND OF ARARAT.

The lecture in aid of Henry's Church Sunday School, by Mr. H. T. Kalem, on Monday evening was fairly well attended. Dr. Christie occupied the chair. The lecturer, commenced by making a comparison between the description of Armenia given in the bible and the land as it is now, showing the striking identity existing between them. The history of Armenia goes back 3000 years before Christ. The people never called themselves Armenians, but are called after their founder. Armenia is inhabited by several other nations. Mr. Kalem gave a sketch on the blackboard of the different letters of the Armenian alphabet. They have two alphabets, which we have not in our alphabet, one of which is equal to "dx." The Sultan holds both religious and political power in Turkey. After Armenia was conquered the Sultan would not allow schools or the exercise of religious freedom. The Turkish army were not provided with religious books, on plunder taken from inhabitants of various towns. Armenia is to-day progressing rapidly. It has schools, colleges and a measure of religious liberty, among the teachers are some of the most learned theologians of the day. Its population is 2,000,000, one million of which are scattered through three nations. The cause of this is the result of the power of religious liberty based on Christianity. These nations were at one time the richest and most powerful in the land, but like all bible nations they have fallen. After he saw England and Canada had more love for the Mohammedans, because they lived their religion, while our English Christians do not. Any measure of religious liberty enjoyed in Armenia to-day is the result of the power of the gospel through the British Nation. Mr. Kalem gave an interesting opportunity for questions on the subject.

Rev. Mr. Forlong asked if preaching was allowed. In reply he said "we are just as free as you are now." Several conversions have been made through preaching from Mohammedanism to Christianity, although in many cases the converts suddenly disappear, and are perhaps murdered. The character of the Armenian Church is somewhat like the Roman Catholic Church. The different sects are Catholics, Protestants, Congregationalists and Baptists, the most numerous being the Congregationalists. The soil is good and cheap but could not be settled owing to plundering, wandering Arabs.

A vote of thanks was passed to the lecturer for the very interesting information contained in his address.

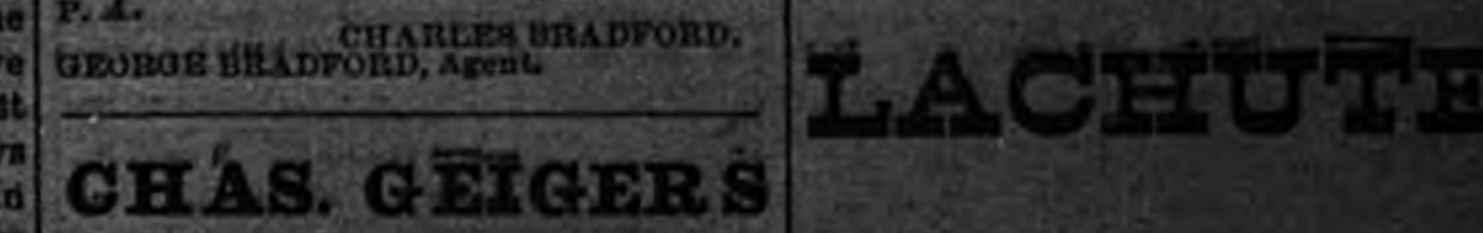

NEWS OF THE DAY.

CANADIAN.

Woodstock is to have electric light. Lord Stanley desires to pay a visit to Kingston at an early date. Two hundred shops have been started in Montreal in order to get electric light for 25 cents a night. Shaford the same. Track is being laid on the Red River Valley road at the rate of two miles a day. Citizens of Kingston have met and denounced Sunday traffic on the Welland Canal.

Discontent is said to be causing numerous desertions from the London Military School.

Crop report from the neighbourhood of the city of Quebec are of a very favourable character.

The Minister of Justice says the Provincial Government must enforce the Dominion Bankruptcy Act.

The Salvation Army barracks in Kingston, rebuilt at a cost of \$10,000, were opened on Sunday.

Mr. and Mrs. Hugh J. Macdonald will spend their summer with Sir John Macdonald at the seaside.

Five officers of the Governor General's Foot Guards have resigned owing to a dispute with the colonel.

A recorder in Montreal compelled a young man to enter into bonds to discontinue visiting a young lady.

Rev. Mr. Mathews, of Quebec, has been elected permanent secretary of the Pan-Protestant Alliance.

The wheat labourers of Montreal are on strike, and the shopkeepers are determined to resist their demand.

It is rumored that there is a possibility of a strike of telegraph operators for more pay and shorter hours.

Sir John Macdonald has read Nathan Mitchell, a Montreal tobaccoist, for using his name for advertising purposes.

Gabriel Dumont has received letters from halfbreeds in the Northwest, threatening rebellion unless their properties are restored.

The mill-tenders at the Hamilton mill works are still out on strike, and it is reported that self-feeding machines will be obtained.

It is reported that Bishop Laflamme, of Three Rivers, has suspended the Jesuits from exercising religious ministrations in his diocese.

The bookkeeper of Queneville, the alderman, has been suspended from his position, as he and his employee have been carrying on a system of graft.

It is announced that Major General Cameron, son-in-law of Sir Charles Tupper, is to succeed General Oliver as Commandant of the R. M. College at Kingston.

The structure being erected at Ontario Beach for a summer hospital for children was blown down on Saturday. One workman was killed and another injured.

Two Mennonite gentlemen from Russia have chosen a township west of the Souris river, in Manitoba, for a party of their fellow-countrymen, who will arrive in the spring.

Judge Falconbridge, who, with Mr. T. F. Galt, and others, is spending his vacation at the fishing camp of Mr. F. Q. Macdonald, is killing the largest salmon taken there for several years.

The fish, which was captured after a hard and exciting struggle, lasting one hour and fifty minutes, weighed 45 pounds and measured 49 inches in length. A large number of salmon have been taken by the judge's party.

The citizens of Canton, Mass., are alarmed over an epidemic of typhoid fever.

Senator Hoar made a long speech in the United States Senate yesterday attacking the Fisheries Treaty.

The weekly statement shows that at the present date the United States Treasury contains \$10,400,000.

John Zolow of Berlin Wis., has completed the fifth day of his fast. He is very weak but his mind is unclouded.

General Sheridan continues to gain strength, and it is hoped that the work of permanent improvement has been entered upon.

United States Representative McKinley is of opinion that the passage of the Tariff bill is a foregone conclusion, and that it will take place within two or three days.

At Long Island City during a drunken row Saturday night Mr. Watson was thrown from the steep over a three foot banister by three of his tenants and killed.

The Maplewood Park Association of St. Paul, Minn., will see Rev. Dr. Talmage for \$10,000 damages for failing to deliver an address there on the 4th inst. as agreed.

The floods at Parkersburg, West Va., continue and the destruction to property along the Little Kanawha and Ohio rivers is greater than in 1884, when the first flood came.

It is reported that the efforts at destroying the grasshoppers in the northern part of Minnesota have been so successful that at least half a yield of wheat may be expected.

Robert Ryan, a sixteen-year-old colored boy, stabbed Riley Hancock (white), aged nineteen, on Saturday, at Henderson, Ky., and killed him. The murderer was lynched by 50 masked men.

General Fisk, prohibition candidate for President of the United States, says that the Temperance plank of the Republican Convention has driven thousands of voters into the Prohibition ranks.

Serious trouble has arisen on the "Q" track. The trackmen have struck, and the chairman of the Grievance Committee of the Brotherhood of Engineers and the Firemen's Brotherhood have been arrested for conspiracy.

A little French Canadian boy in Oldtown, Maine, is credited with one of the shortest and most complete compositions on record. The teacher told him to write about anything he could see, and this was the result: "The stove. She is cracked."

An Albany woman named Briggs lost her husband a few weeks ago, and to show her grief she slept in his grave in the cemetery. The police, finally, caught her at it, and the judge warned her that a reputation would mean sixty days in the cooler.

Mr. T. M. Wells has completed a clay model of the bronze statue of James W. Marshall, to be erected on the spot where gold was first discovered in California. It is of colossal size, and represents Marshall clad in a miner's dress, holding a nugget in his right hand and with his left pointing to the spot where it was taken.

Rev. Oscar C. McCulloch of Indianapolis, a paper before the Convention of Churches and Clergymen in Buffalo, on a study of Social Degradation, in which he shows the condition of thirty families, through five generations, embracing 1,071 persons, which, with the starting place of hereditary crime, is worthy of the most careful reading.

Two perfectly pure white birds, which were caught in Galena, Ill., have been examined by local ornithologists, who pronounce them genuine robins. These exceedingly rare specimens of the feathered tribe are about two-thirds grown, and were taken from a nest known to have been built by robins of the ordinary red-breasted variety.

A new method of punishing dishonest bank clerks is now being tried in a certain institution of that kind in New York. Some time ago a clerk's accounts were investigated and he was found to have embezzled thousands of dollars. To remove and protect the man would have been troublesome and apt to hurt the reputation of the bank, so they made him stay as if nothing had happened, but have placed him in such a position that he can take no more, and informed his fellow-

AGRICULTURAL.

NOTES.

The honey crop of California is said to be large, and the product is of the very best quality.

Gulls are rarely seen on the shore shouldered by the water, but when they are, they are always on the wing, and when they are on the wing, they are always on the wing.

Have you never noticed that the place to look for the chickens—and find them too—on a hot day, is under the natural bushes? Take this hint, and you will have your chickens, if convenient, such natural shade.

Feed has much to do with the quantity of milk, but the breed of the cow has much more to do with it. A poor cow will give poor milk, even with the richest feed, while a good cow will continue to give rich milk on poor food.

When the udder of the cow becomes hard, a prolonged bathing of the udder with warm water is the best remedy. Use the water freely, and rub the udder during the application; then wipe dry. It should be repeated daily until relief be given.

When held up to a strong light, a fresh egg is very clear, and the air-cell is large and is very small. The smaller the air-cell the fresher the egg, as the cell expands as the egg becomes stale. A fresh egg has a somewhat rough shell, while that of a stale one is very smooth.

An advocate of corn-fed pork admits that the hog fed the corn is the sweetest and tenderest meat, and if taste be a criterion in pork, as it is reckoned to be everything else that is eatable, the fruit-fed and milk-fed pork is certainly best. But he adds that if greater firmness be desired, it may be had by feeding the hog for a few weeks of fattening by feeding corn meal, not corn in the ear.

It is said that the cheapest and best mode of keeping lice out of the poultry-house is to add a quart of kerosene oil to each bucket of strong soap suds on washing days, and thoroughly wash the legs and feet, roosts, and every portion of the poultry-house, forcing the liquid into the cracks and crevices. It will kill the vermin as soon as it shall touch them, being one of the best insecticides known.

The operation of disinfecting is easy and comparatively painless if performed on young calves. Watch the signs of the coming horn, which will generally show itself when the calf is five or six weeks old. Remove it then, and it will never start again. There is no doubt that hornless cattle will, in a few years, sell for the least price in many places they do now, and disinfecting is the easiest way to add to their value.

A bill which has passed the Federal Council of Canada provides for the pensioning of all working people who are incapacitated or who have arrived at the age of 70.

It is reported that a marriage is being arranged between the Carverville and one of the daughters of the late Sir John Macdonald, the entire approval of Prince Bismarck.

Mr. W. J. Ashley, M. A., lecturer of Lincoln and Corpus Christi Colleges, Oxford, has been appointed to the chair of Political Science in the University of Toronto. There were 21 applicants for the position.
