OTTAWA VALLEY ADVOCATE

PRINCIPAL BUILDINGS.

The Agricultural Society of Argenteuil received a severe blow at the hands of the County Council at its last meeting. At the annual dinner of the society and again at the election of its officers, we expressed the opinion that the only way to have permanent buildings was to sink self and resolve to act as the interests of the society dictated. In these columns, we suggested that the members of the society should decide to abide by the decision of the majority. We solemnly affirm if St. Andrews had been chosen at that meeting as fairly and as unanimously as the present site was chosen, a more ardent supporter of permanent buildings in St. Andrews than this paper could not be found. The County Council cannot choose this site, it is the society's privilege to do that, but the council must sanction the choice, and unless they have some good reason for not doing so, they must place the charge of obstructing the progress of the Society. Have they any reason, whatsoever? The only reason was given by Mr. McKay, that an amicable settlement might be arrived at. No such settlement can be made, as it was voted for, to one against the other, and not over the persuasive eloquence of the county attorney can change the opinion of such a large majority. We have nothing to say against the members of the Agricultural Society in St. Andrews as a whole, because the large majority are in favor of abiding by the decision of the public meeting. But with the few obstructionists, we have no sympathy. The vote was taken fairly and was representative of the wishes of the society, the proceedings are perfect, legally, we say so on equal authority, and the sooner the Society gets rid of the few oppositionists it possesses, the faster it will progress. So much for the St. Andrews faction. It has been said, and how truly we know not, that some wire pulling has been going on in Lachute; that interested parties in the East and Centre wards acquired the consent of the County Council and endeavored to place the present site to another in Lachute, more favorable to their own particular interests. We have no personal knowledge that such is the case. It was asserted, however, at the council that the name of the director of the Society was given to the County Council, and that he had been asked to give his consent to the present site. If so, we have the same words of condemnation for the Lachute faction as for that of St. Andrews. It is impossible for the council to change the site chosen, they must either confirm or annul the proceedings already taken, and before the site can be changed another public meeting must be called, and the vote taken and again submitted to the County Council. We judge the feelings of the majority of the members at being interfered with by those who should have aided them, if they vote again for permanent buildings in Lachute, at any place other than the one chosen. Consequently, the result of the action of the Lachute faction is to prevent the buildings being erected at all. The council should have listened to the voice of the society as expressed in their vote on the site chosen, and not listened to the voice of individual either in St. Andrews or Lachute, who has some private interests to advance.

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COUNTY COUNCIL.

A regular meeting of the County Council was held on Wednesday last in the old Court House. Present: Messrs. Dunbar, Brown, Kelly, Strong, Simpson, McKell, Faguet, Chambers, Mayors Cooke, Amundsen, Milroy, Harrington; were absent. Minutes of last meeting were read and approved. The first question was the account of St. Andrews for the year ending 31st March, amounting to \$418, left over from last meeting. The opinion of the attorney was that the county was liable. On motion the account was ordered to be paid.

Moved by Mayor Brown, seconded by Mayor Dunbar, that the council petition the Quebec Legislature through our member, to alter the Municipal Code in order to make the municipalities responsible for the breaking of winter roads on the Ottawa River.

Petitions from Wm. Thornton, Wm. Davidson and Robert Morrison were received for an appointment as caretaker of the new Court House.

Moved by Mayor McKell, seconded by Mayor Dunbar, that Mr. Thornton be appointed without salary, but that he have the use of part of the building to live in.

Mr. Campbell offered to supply the new Court House with blinds for \$67.17.

Mr. McKimmie offered to supply blinds for \$50.00.

Mayor McKell—"We never had a blind here and we can do without them."

The council decided not to buy blinds. A communication was presented from the Agricultural Society asking the ratification of the choice made by the society, of a site on which to hold their annual exhibitions.

Moved by Mayor McKell, seconded by Mayor Simpson, that the matter be laid over until next meeting.

Mr. Beaton on behalf of the society, said it was doubtful whether the council could take cognizance of this question at any other meeting than the one immediately after the public meeting of the society.

Mayor McKell thought it might be laid over.

Mr. McKell said that the people of St. Andrews think they have a right to the buildings there, because they were the founders of the society and the largest exhibitors. He repeated the old story of new members being allowed to vote, and that St. Andrews had not been treated fairly. They had made a more generous offer than Lachute. The people of St. Andrews were to be disappointed, that they were about forming a new society, and he presented a list of over one hundred names as members of the new society protesting against the action of the meeting. If the matter was postponed, an amicable settlement might result therefrom.

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GRASSHOPPER DESTRUCTION IN THE NORTHWEST

There have been suggested many explanations of the well-nigh wholesale destruction of orchards throughout the Northwest during the past few years. One is, that some changes have rendered high ground unfit for orchards. Naturally, this has much to recommend it, for the orchard on high ground has been considered the better, the rank and file of orchardists. The evidence that low ground is now the better, is not near so conclusive as many would have us suppose; nevertheless, in many cases the orchard on low ground has suffered the fatality. It is not saying too much to affirm that high ground has become less adapted and low ground better adapted to orchard growth.

This being the case, it behooves us to discover what has wrought the change. My investigations have convinced me that it is not any peculiar climatic condition that is responsible. The cause lies in the soil. Orchard ground is very rarely manured sufficiently. An orchard given the manure of a cow or a horse, will support the most gross feeders, and as our orchards are planted the trees are a heavy drain on the fertility of the soil. But in addition, another crop is kept on the land. It is usually cultivated crop (likely a vegetable) the first year, and then a grain crop (say) while the trees are young, and after a year a grass crop. PRESERVING THE FROG.

Reference is here made to that very important cushion beneath the horse's foot—the frog, so-called. If, in seeking a horse, you find one that has a long, strong frog preserved; the cushion, so to speak wide, full and soft, the probability is that the remainder of the foot will be in good order. There may be an exception to this in the case of a used-up horse having been turned out to pasture, and getting long enough to permit the frog to take on new growth. If the frog be fully protected and well maintained, the hoof will be found but little if at all contracted, for the very good reason that the hoof cannot readily contract if the frog be kept in its normal position. But it is the smith, the horse-shoer who ruins the frog; that is, very many of them do this. During the many years that the writer has driven horses, he has always made it a rule to be present during the shoeing, and has never permitted more than the slightest trimming of the frog, nothing more than the trimming off of insignificant parts, already detached. The smith can mutilate and seriously damage the hoof by the use of the rasp; but, fortunately the frog is protected by the sole of the shoe, and even the knife requires to be sharp, else the peculiar nature of the frog will resist. Fever in the feet is a prolific source of injury to the frog, and should be overcome at the earliest possible moment. If the frog be dry, black and is crumbling by keeping up too complete a state of dryness. Cutting the frog away at the time of shoeing, then setting the foot upon oakum, in such a manner as to prevent the frog from pressing against the sole of the shoe, and even interferes with its development and usefulness. The most important function of the frog is to lessen the shock to the foot in its contact with the ground. This being the fact, it should be so maintained, and the shoe be so constructed that it will keep the frog in place in for a fair share of the weight of the horse. Whatever substance the horse is required to tread.

AVOIDING VERMIN.

A four years' trial of a basement room as a poultry house, [with from 80 to 100 hens, ought to be long enough to demonstrate the value of such rooms for the purpose of sheltering poultry. During the whole of this time my poultry have been free from all diseases, and have laid well—better, I think, than I ever had hens to do before. But what is the more remarkable, my poultry have not been sick since the first year of time. Summer or winter it is the same; there are no flies. I believe it is all due to the kind of room in which I keep them. No extra pains are taken with my poultry or the room. They are fed regularly (once a day) on good corn meal, and have the run of the farm and free picking over the garden and field peas—in the fall. The house is kept clean by sweeping and the use of plaster. I save a good deal of excellent fertilizer from my hens, but do not use them. In fact, this is the reason for it. They are healthy and doing well, and I think it wise to "let well enough alone."

I am satisfied that my hens keep clear of vermin only because they are sheltered in a cellar. I do not know why. It may be because the "birds" are in a room that is slightly cool and damp, and perhaps this is repulsive to lice. Or it may be because of the uniform temperature of the room all the year round. Or it may be owing to some other cause that I have not yet found out. I am sure that my hens are clean, free of vermin, and have been for the past four years, ever since I began to shelter them in this basement. I am disposed to think a cellar the proper place to keep poultry for several reasons.—B. W. J. Spottsville, Va.

APPLES AHEAD.

The English and Scotch crops are very poor, while our representatives who has just returned from the apple districts on the continent reports about half crop. This augurs well for Canadians, especially for good early apples, which will certainly make good prices. Quality is the great thing in our markets; a slightly better quality will make a big difference in price, more particularly at the close of the season.—James Lindsay & Son, Edinburgh, Aug. 7.

Our advices from 67 apple districts report the crop to be "below the average" in 10 districts; "about the average" in 10 districts; "medium" or "fair" crop in 7 districts; while in only five cases it is deemed as "average" or "satisfactory." From this it will be seen that the English crop is at least a partial failure.

Our reports from the fruit districts are promising well, and are likely to be both large and good. Notwithstanding this we look for a favorable reception during the season for Canadian and American fruit well packed and of good size and quality, but would not expect to see the same quantity of the best quality of common fruit, as such, is likely to yield poor results. The shipment of "summer" fruit is at all times attended with much risk, on account of the soft character, but small portions of the best keeping quality, occasionally, are sent to the States.

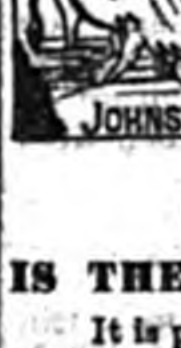
