THE EXHIBITION.

The Most Successful Ever Held—Thousand People Present.

As anticipated, Wednesday's show was the climax of previous successes in the Agricultural Society, and had the weather been more favorable, not only would the first day's exhibits have been larger, but the attendance might have been one-third more. The first day's work was retarded by the rain which came down in torrents. But the new buildings proved an excellent protection and the exhibits were displayed at leisure. Owing no doubt to the weather the exhibits in many classes were small in number, but not inferior in quality. The exhibit of apples by Mr. M. Smith was certainly inferior to none ever exhibited in this country. The exhibit of bread was exceedingly large. In conversation with one of the judges, he stated that he had never seen such large exhibit of good bread, great difficulty being experienced in awarding the prize. He also assured us that there was as good bread and loaves which received no prize. John Martin again takes first on butter the exhibit of which was fully up to the standard. The butter in prints was also largely competed for, but in many cases the prints were too soft. The cheese made by farmers was not first class, at least not so good as in previous years. This is no doubt due to the large quantity of cheese which is being made by the factories. Upstairs was reserved for dry goods, butter, cheese, fruit, fancy wares, etc., while on the ground floor, were exhibited below. In the Fancy work department much interest was manifested in a quilt which obtained first prize as needle work, exhibited by Mrs. Peter Campbell. A suit of clothes exhibited by Mr. E. St. Jean, attracted much attention, and as a result that gentleman will not be called upon by many of our farmers. The display of Messrs. McOuat & McRae was the centre of attraction on both days. Mr. McOuat himself was in charge and explained the various implements which are constantly used by farmers. Mr. A. Mitchell, had a very fine display of carriage and sleighs which drew credit to the manufacturing industry of Lachute. Messrs. Peter Campbell and J. E. Tremblay & Co. made a display of flour, rolled oats, family cereals etc., very creditable to their facilities. The corn exhibited by Mr. Hebble took first prize and was the largest ever seen at this show. Mr. Wm. Smith received honorable mention for a very fine exhibit of Western corn.

THE SECOND DAY
opened very gloomy, about eight o'clock rain began to fall and the thermometer fell low, making travelers wish they had heavier clothes on. About ten o'clock however, the rain gave place to a strong wind, which was a better improvement.

At an early hour crowds commenced to besiege the gate for admission. The arrangements for admitting visitors were first class, the patent turnstile erected by Messrs. McOuat & McRae, registering every one that entered thereby. The stalls for horses were at once taken up and many more would have been taken if they had been ready for occupation. Among the attractions on the grounds was a display of agricultural machinery exhibited by the Massey Mfg. Co. in charge of Mr. Caron, who displayed the working of the celebrated Massey self-binder. The Montreal Witness had a tent on which was printed in large letters, Equal Rights and Prohibition. A short distance therefrom the Watchman pitched its tent with the motto, "Protect home industries," and "Have faith in Canada."

THE LACHUTE MATCH
between the boys of the Academy and the town boys, afforded much amusement to the on-lookers. The town boys were not "it," however, as the Academy boys took three straight. There were many samples of brilliant individual play, but not a sufficient attempt at team play. Much interest was manifested in the contest over the prize for the best.

LADY DRIVER, among those who handled the ribbon with great skill were Miss Mitchell, Miss Farrel, Miss McNaughton, Mrs. Beattie and Miss Buchanan.

THE SPEECHES
After the judges had finished their work the President of the Society called the people together around the band stand where Mr. Barron read the following address to Hon. Col. Rhodes:

To the Honorable Col. William Rhodes, Commissioner of Agriculture of the Province of Quebec.
SIR.—In the name of the President, Directors and members of the Agricultural Society of the County of Argenteuil, I beg to extend to you a most hearty welcome to this Annual Exhibition, and to assure you that as this is the first occasion on which the Honorable Minister of Agriculture has been pleased to honor the Society with his presence at their Exhibition, we are not backward in appreciating the great honor that has been conferred upon our Society by your presence.

We are aware of the deep interest you have always manifested in the welfare of agriculture generally throughout the Province, and trust that your presence in our midst to-day will excite a greater interest among all the members of the Society. The annual Exhibition of the Society has long been held in a healthy condition and steadily progressing. In connection we would express the hope that you will find

be pleased to fill the honorable position of Commissioner of Agriculture for this Province, and that this may not be the last occasion on which we shall have the honor of your presence with us at our Annual Exhibition.

In reply Col. Rhodes said the address just presented did credit to the intelligence of the inhabitants of this county. As Minister of Agriculture he might say he was there in that capacity only. His visit was not a political one. He came here at the invitation of Mr. Owens whom was his personal friend although opposed to him in politics. He felt that it was necessary that he should know what the particular wants of the farmers were and consequently was trying to educate himself by going among the farmers themselves and come in personal contact with them. He was well satisfied with the exhibition, and could add his testimony to the excellent judgment exercised in selecting the grounds. He would consider it his duty to report to his colleagues that the Society had secured for itself the very best facilities for holding their exhibition. No doubt Mr. Owens and himself by putting their heads together during the evening session would adopt some means of aiding the Society. After some other remarks concerning stock etc., the hon. gentleman concluded amid much cheering.

Mr. J. C. Wilson M. P., next addressed the meeting very shortly in which he congratulated the farmers and hoped they would continue to endeavor that spirit of enterprise the evidence of which was seen to-day.

Mr. Owens, M. P. P. said that "God helped those who helped themselves," and now that a representative member of the government was present and had seen how we had helped ourselves, they would no doubt extend a helping hand.

The meeting then adjourned to the dining room where dinner was served by the ladies of St. Simon's church. Mr. John Martin, President, occupied the chair and had on his right Col. Rhodes, Mr. Owens, M. P. P., and Mr. B. Beauchamp, M. P. P., and on his left Mr. J. C. Wilson, M. P. After an excellent repast was partaken of, the toast of the Queen, Governor-General, Lieutenant Governor were disposed. Mr. Wilson M. P. replied to the toast of the Dominion Parliament. He said that this had been a pleasant day for him, meeting all his friends in the country, he was not a farmer, but was naturally interested in farming. He believed a medal should be struck for the man who invented county shows. As the member for the Comptons he had not an opportunity to do much for the farmers in their own particular profession but he would endeavor to extend as far as possible among them the benefits of the Ottawa experimental farm. He was glad to meet Col. Rhodes there. It shows a happy condition of things when Mr. Owens could have as his guest a member of the government to which he was opposed.

Messrs. Owens and Beauchamp replied shortly to the toast of the legislature. Mr. Lane proposed the Department of Agriculture, to which Col. Rhodes replied until compelled to leave for the train. Mr. Barron spoke for the ladies, G. F. Calder for the press, Mr. Barr for the visitors.

Votes of thanks were passed to the President, Board of Directors and the Secretary Mr. G. J. Walker. It is over fifty years since the Annual Show was originated and about forty-four years since the first show in Lachute.

About \$100 was taken in at the gate.

THE MORRISON CASE.

One of the most exciting trials ever held in the Province of Quebec, ended on Wednesday last in Sherbrooke, when Donald Morrison, the gigantic prisoner, was convicted of manslaughter, for killing one Lucius Warren an alleged bailiff, who was attempting to arrest him for arson. The facts of the shooting are well known to our readers, and the desperate attempts made to secure Morrison's arrest are still fresh in our memories. That the jury found some difficulty in coming to a decision, is evident from the fact that they were locked up for over twenty-four hours, before arriving at a verdict. The great sympathy shown for Morrison by some of the most influential and respectable inhabitants of the district where he resided, who have known him since his youth, goes to show that he is not the hardened criminal one would expect to find convicted for the awful crime of manslaughter. The general impression is that Morrison up to the time of the shooting was more sinned against than sinning. There is no doubt he must have had the reputation of a determined character or else, the ordinary peace officers would have had no hesitation in executing the warrant for his arrest. But it may be that this reputation was due to idle tongues, and that if the regular constable had gone quietly to Morrison and advised him to give himself up, he would have done so. However, that may be the facts show that this Warren, who was a Yankee whiskey smuggler, of bad reputation, and addicted to brag and blow and bluster, offered his services not as a loyal citizen, but as a hired assassin, and it was his duty to shoot him. When he saw Warren approaching he told him twice to keep back, and his own opinion of the evidence is, that it shows Warren either drew or attempted to draw his pistol first. Did Morrison believe his only safety lay in shooting first? Our first conviction is that he did, and as most men under the circumstances would have done, he saved his own life at the expense of the enemy. To show his good faith however, Morrison should have given himself up at once. When a man kills another under any circumstances whatsoever, an investigation should be held. It is impossible to hold Morrison free of blame, yet his punishment should not be severe. He has suffered much already. To condemn him for twenty years in penitentiary would be cruel and unjust. In trials for murder it would seem that a defect exists in our criminal law, which often places jurors in a difficult position and occasionally causes them to bring in a verdict of "not guilty" when they feel that the accused deserves some punishment. This defect in the wide range left to the judge in the severity of punishment for manslaughter, from imprisonment for life downwards. If it were possible to make three degrees of manslaughter, the lowest of which would subject the accused to imprisonment for a period not exceeding five years, the second fifteen years and the third between fifteen years and life, we believe that in many cases jurors would come to their decision with greater ease. The general impression among the jury seemed to be that Morrison deserved some punishment, which however, should be very slight. Yet they knew by their verdict of manslaughter they placed the power into the hands of the judge of sending the poor man to penitentiary for life. It is well however, that in this case the authority of the law has been vindicated and it must be thoroughly understood that the days of outlawry have passed.

THE 60,000 SHARE.

The acceptance under certain conditions by the Protestant Committee of the Quebec Council of Public Instruction of the \$60,000 share of the money voted by the Jesuit Estates Act is recognized as a significant action. The Toronto Mail is intensely agitated thereby, for it sees clearly enough that the vote of the Protestant Committee knocks the bottom out of many lengthy discussions and misleading arguments. It endeavors to create the impression that the members of the Protestant Committee are not representative men, because they are not elected, but appointed by the Crown. Such a contention will not stand for a moment. To say that the Bishop of Quebec, Sir William Dawson, Rev. Dr. Cornish, Dr. Heneker, Rev. Dr. Shaw, Archdeacon Lindsay, etc., are not thoroughly representative Protestants, seeing that they are really chosen for high offices by their respective denominations, is to state what is not true. But the Mail also declares that the members of the Protestant Committee were simply administering the funds voted by the Legislature and had no authority to refuse the \$60,000. This argument, too, is wholly untenable. If these respected gentlemen with intimate knowledge of all the facts in the case voted to accept the Protestant portion of the money they must have done so because they believed they were acting in the Protestant interest. Supposing they were in the position of trustees, mere automatons, as the Mail tries to make out, that would not force them to administer their duties illegally, or do what they thought wrong. No trustee is bound by any such obligation. The members of the committee are too high-minded to play such a part.

Those who try to throw doubts upon the action of the Protestant Committee are evidently ignorant of the relation of these gentlemen to the Protestant minority in Quebec. They are men of the highest character, representing Presbyterians, Anglicans, Methodists, Congregationalists, etc., and are incapable of betraying the interests of their co-religionists. With the special knowledge they have of the best course to pursue, their action is most significant.—The Empire.

The defendant in this case made, a solemn declaration in Montreal, that he was a resident of that city and had his name entered upon the supplementary list as a voter in one of the polling districts of Montreal W. St. Some time afterwards, he made a declaration that he was a resident of Lachute and was registered as a voter here. Owing to an accident this fact became known to the plaintiff, who served a notice upon the defendant in the manner prescribed by law. When the case came up for hearing the defendant filed a preliminary objection, calling into question the right of plaintiff to make the application on the grounds that at the time said notice was given he was not an elector. In answer to this objection the plaintiff held, first, that he did not require to be an elector and second, granting for argument sake that he did, he was to all intents and purposes an elector in law, and entitled to the privilege of objecting to names on the list. That the notice was merely formal and as defendant had appeared he could not plead want of proper notice. In regard to the first contention, sub-section 2, of section 19 as amended reads as follows:—

"ANY PERSON desiring to object to, or to add to, or in any way amend or correct the original list or either of the supplementary lists, on final revision, shall have the right so to object, etc."

Does "any person" mean "any elector"? It would certainly seem not by the clauses of interpretation, which says that "the expression 'person' means any male person including an Indian, and excluding a person of Mongolian or Chinese race." Hodgins in his work on the Canadian Franchise, says "any person" in its extended meaning includes electors and non-electors, although most jurists would construe it to mean, either an elector, or one claiming to be an elector, but was actually on the supplementary list and had been added on final revision. This is, it is contended, is a proof of sufficient interest to enable him to object. The Court took the objections on deliberation and ordered the case to go to proof. The defendant on being sworn deposed that he was a resident of Lachute, and had been for over two years. He admitted having made application to be placed on the list in Montreal. The plaintiff thereupon withdrew his objection as he had no desire to prevent any voter from obtaining one vote, but objected to him obtaining two. There are the facts connected with the case, which has seemed of sufficient importance to some correspondent of the *Witness* (well known) who gave that journal a very inaccurate report of the proceedings before the court and one which, strange to say, coincides almost word for word with that in the *Independent*. What has puzzled most readers is, why the court could rule the plaintiff's objection, and at the same time reverse its decision? As a matter of fact the court did not rule the point well taken, but has fixed the 19th of October for judgment.

REVISION OF THE VOTERS' LIST.

In two issues of the *Independent* references have been made to our interference with the Voters' List.

The point held by the Revising Committee in one constituted by law and deservingly of the respect due to any other court of "competent jurisdiction," therefore, the impression that the court would allow any elector to be deprived of his rights, is not only innocent in the extreme, but detrimental to the due administration of justice. Such a contempt of court might be punished with fine or imprisonment. As a matter of fact, which can be verified by consulting the record of the court, objections have been made by G. F. Calder to only three names in the county. One of these was struck out by the court on the evidence of the Secretary-Treasurer of the municipality that the person objected to, had left the county. The second is still under advisement, and the third was retained. In reference to the one struck out by the court, the evidence showed that an attempt at double registration had been made by an individual. To be registered in two municipalities as an elector is a crime under the law. The court is not to be trifled with in this respect. Persons qualified under the law to vote are entitled to be registered as voters and to vote in the polling districts in

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Annual Conference of School Officials and Teachers.

Owing to the disagreeable weather of Friday last the attendance at the annual meeting of school officials and teachers was not so large as in former years. Nevertheless much interest was manifested in the proceedings. Rev. Mr. Leford was present and in a conversational manner gave information on many important points of school law. A petition was presented asking the council of Public Instruction to name Lachute as an examining centre for diplomas. Mr. Rexford received the petition and intimated that he thought it would be granted, although the question of cost would be a serious one. Being shown a teacher's engagement, which was signed by the school managers and bound the teacher to collect the fees, he declared it to be no engagement at all. The school managers had no more authority to engage a teacher than any other rate payer and it was not the duty of the teacher to collect the fees. Quite a long discussion took place over the collection of the fees by the teacher. The Secretary said that the teacher might as a matter of convenience receive the monthly fees but it was not the teacher's duty to collect them, but that of the Secretary-Treasurer.

Mr. Haney asked if owing to the Jesuit bill, the Superior Education grant would be diminished this year.

Mr. Rexford said he was sorry to say that the grant for Superior Education would be less than last year by about \$1000, but he was happy to say that the Jesuit Act had nothing whatever to do with the reduction. One of the sources of revenue for Superior Education was from the sale of marriage licenses. For every marriage performed by a Protestant clergyman, \$10.00 goes into the Superior Education fund and two dollars to the Commission who issues the license. Thus when marriages were plentiful, the fund was large. For some reason however, the number of marriages during the past year had fallen off considerably and thus the revenue from that source had diminished.

Mr. McKee said he understood that a portion of the money for marriage licenses went to the Roman Catholics.

Mr. Rexford said, "No, not any, it all goes to the Protestant Committee."
