WHAT ARE THE BOYS READING?

The records of our criminal courts, the experience of our police magistrates and the confessions of criminals themselves, give positive testimony that there is no more potent evil than bad books. Boys have been induced to commit crimes, to run away from home by reading the five cent literature which is perilled to be sown broadcast over our land. Nor is it at all strange that such should be the result. From anecdote, a good cool could hardly be expected. These books to the nature mind seem to be so full of utter nonsense, and unlikely events, that they are cast aside as being able to do little good or little harm. But on the childish mind the effect is different. The youth is more susceptible to the influence of the painted heroes, who are not heroes at all, but simply the very worst class of brigands. The evil inflicted upon children by these miserable tales is both negative and positive, negative in that it fills up the mind with nothing lasting or beneficial, and positive in that it creates a positive tendency to vice and a distaste for a better class of reading. So much in a general way, but now let us come to the real object of this article. We would like every father and mother who may read these words to pause and ask themselves "do I know what my boy is reading?" It has come to our knowledge, but lately, that a system, perfect in detail, has been in existence for some time in the Town of Lachute, for the supplying of books to our boys at the very small sum of one cent. As far as we can learn the arrangement works in this way. To join this club, a boy pays five cents. Membership entitles him to borrow a book for one cent. If the book is destroyed or lost the club exacts five cents. We have not seen these books, and consequently cannot say positively whether they are of a pernicious character or not, but it is the duty of parents to know what their children are reading, and prevent a possible and in many cases a probable sorrow.

UNFAIR.

The Protestant Committee of the Council of Public Instruction have been criticized at the Teachers' convention and indeed have left themselves open for criticism for the manner in which they divide the Superior Education grant. This grant is not a fixed one, as one of the sources of its revenue varies from time to time, viz: the amount derived from marriage licences. Last year Cupid was very inactive and the revenue from the union of hearts and hands fell short of \$1,000. Now it would be supposed that such institution or school receiving part of the Superior Education Fund, would be compelled to share a share of the loss caused by Cupid's carelessness. But, *mirabile dictu*, such has not been the case. Our rich colleges and schools with their large endowments etc, have received their usual share, while the poor country academies are forced to bear the whole burden of the reduction alone. As the teacher is held responsible for the success of the school, in passing a good examination and what seems more important to the commissioners, in obtaining a good large grant, another branch of education will require to be added to our already over crowded curriculum. That is, the importance and necessity of getting married, and that by means of a license. To teach this subject properly, of course it will be the duty of our teachers to set the example. Lachute academy cannot complain of its principal on this score.

\$500 DAMAGES.

Mr. Noyes, a retired Liberal ex-member of the Quebec Legislature, has received \$500 damages, for being called an Orangeman. During a political contest in Sherbrooke, a newspaper made the statement that Mr. Noyes was a Freemason and an Orangeman. That gentleman immediately took an attorney to damages against the journal. At the trial it was shown that Mr. Noyes was a Freemason, but not an Orangeman. The court awarded \$500 damages, caused to the candidate by the use of this name, as it was held by a certain class of electors that Orangemen, as a body, held principles which were inimical to the interests of the state. We feel sure that there are many in this country who would not consider themselves injured to the extent of \$500 by being called Orangemen. But aside from the question of damages, it would be better, in discussing politics and especially during a political campaign, if newspapers and individuals would confine themselves to the discussion of a man's politics and not his religion. There has been too much of this politico-religious thugism practiced on both sides of politics.

CONTENDING GRIT F. ACTIONS.

Still there is being fiercely waged the intestine conflict of the Grit camps, between the factions for and against Mr. Laurier as leader. His supporters in the party councils have gained the day, for the time at least, but the "faction" has by no means abated. So they wrangle and jangle, the *Globe* and *Mail* heading the respective factions. The two organs are substantially agreed in supporting the policy of the party, but differ in the matter of making the scheme of Mr. Wilmot, with improvements by Mr. Hill, the only plank in the Grit platform. It is as the unwarmed plank that is kept in the shade, the policy of an alliance with the *Liberal*, that there is this domestic dissension. The *Globe* thinks that this combination is a clever political move, and supports Mr. Laurier as he represents

entative for the party leadership. The *Mail* thinks the alliance is not likely to bring success to the party, and therefore is antagonistic to Mr. Laurier.

In their squabbling the *Globe* taunts the *Mail* with inconsistency in contending "that Mr. Laurier is a 'slave to the Ultramontanes of Quebec' (2) that the Ultramontanes 'oppose Mr. Laurier because of his 'Independence and Liberalism'." In reality the inconsistency is in Mr. Laurier. He knows that his success in Quebec is utterly out of the question without the aid of the Ultramontanes, and there he will say and do anything to secure and keep their alliance.

He knows that the combination is less popular among his followers in Ontario, so in Toronto he repudiated his Ultramontane allies with rather more vigor than was prudent, for they took offence on reading his words and in their momentary anger left him in the lurch in Richelieu.

The *Mail*, however, cannot plume itself on having the best of this little discussion, for its own favorite plank in the Grit platform is the work of a leader who is equally disingenuous. Mr. Wilmot also has one avowed policy at home and another to be imposed upon our people, just like Mr. Laurier. Possibly there is some real difference of opinion as to the best methods for their party between the *Globe* and *Mail*, and there is the aggravation of the rivalry for the chief oratorship, but it is difficult to determine how far their fights are theatrical, designed to attract different sets of followers to the Grit camp. It is certain that wrangle as they may they will bury the hatchet when there is a question of a joint attack upon the Conservative statesmen, who are the constitutional representatives of the people of Canada. So too, the *Rouges* and *Ultramontanes* of Quebec, though frequently showing their detestation of each other, do not seem to have abandoned Messrs. Laurier and Mercier, under whose banners they are content to fight against the Conservatives and those patriotic Liberals who cannot follow the present Grit leaders in their devious ways.—*The Empire*.

A very destructive insect has been discovered in a number of the flour mills of Ontario which is likely to cause disastrous results to the Canadian Miller. This insect is called the *Ephestia Kuhlmeieri*, and was first discovered in Italy some twelve years ago. Nearly all the ports in the Mediterranean sea were visited by it and now the scourge has found its way to Canada. It is a species of moth and lays its eggs in flour. A grub is developed in a few days which multiplies at a prodigious rate. In the Canadian mill where it was discovered, the only remedy was to scour the entire mill with hot steam. Perhaps science will step in and give a preventative against the spread of this pest.

The fact that the surplus for the last fiscal year of the Dominion was in the neighborhood of two millions is grounds for congratulation, seeing that this is a condition of things which has not arisen from an increased rate of taxation, but under the very same tariff of the preceding year. It shows an increased ability to consume and therefore an increase in the prosperity of the country.

OUR SYSTEM OF TAXATION.

A distinction may be made between what we may call voluntary taxation, and that which is not denominated strictly under that name, but it is difficult indeed to find a term well to define. What I mean is this—and the statement may go for what it is worth, and it is made prettily with reference to a favorite method of computation or calculation which states that the taxation of this country is as much per head of its population, as indicated by the naming of it in that way, that every man, woman and child in the country has to pay that much per head into the coffers of the country. Taxation, then, may be of two kinds—voluntary, and that you may call involuntary taxation.

Here is a very practical illustration, let me take the case of three persons to illustrate the incidence of the tax, who are in your well-to-do man, who has means, who has luxurious tastes, and who is disposed to gratify them. With that no one finds fault with this country, and that it is disposed to gratify them, and has the means to do it, he shall pay a tax for doing it. If he goes outside the country to get his luxuries and to get the things which he desires. So, if such a man as that buys in the city of New York \$1,000 worth of fine furniture and brings it into Canada, the country taxes him to the extent of \$240 upon that. If he is a moderately inclined and buys a piano which is worth \$1,000, he pays upon that, when it comes across the customs line, \$330. If he is fond of statuary and makes a slight investment in that line to the extent of \$500, he pays \$175 in duty in bringing it across the line. If he buys expensive plate to the value of \$500, the duty upon it is \$150. If he wears jewelry, or buys it for his household and brings it from a foreign country to the value of \$500, he pays \$100 duty upon it. If he is fond of wine and buys 20 dozen of champagne, he pays upon that a tax of \$130. If he requires silks for the wear of himself and his family, to the modest tune of \$300, and imports them, he pays a tax of \$90. If he wishes a fine carriage and wants one to suit him, and brings it across the line, and pays for it \$300, he pays a duty of \$175 upon it. Carriage for his house of extra make, which he may buy in a foreign market to the extent of \$200 in value, he pays a duty of 25 per cent, upon, or \$50. Upon that modest stock of luxuries for a man of means who is disposed to gratify his desires in that respect, he has paid into the treasury of the country \$1,700 in duty. That is one man's contribution, but it is the contribution of a rich man who wishes these luxuries, who imports them from abroad, and who, the country pays, being able to pay for them, must keep up the revenue of the country by paying a tax upon them. Now, who will take No. 2, and that is the case of the farmer of this country, whom we all love, and for whom we all desire to do the best we can. The farmer of this country lives upon his

farm in the rich Province of Ontario, we shall say. Nearly all the foods that are used by the farmer are raised upon his own farm and pay no duty; the wheat he raises he has ground at the neighboring mill, it is brought into his house and he pays no duty upon it. The home itself, the outhouses, the barns, all that is necessary in the way of housing for the work of the farm is built out of woods which grow in this country, of which we have a surplus and upon which he pays no duty.

Mr. McMullen. What about the nails?

Mr. Foster. The clothing for himself and his family is in many cases made from the wool which is raised by the farmer himself, or if not raised by the farmer himself, he clothes himself and his family with the products of our mills, the raw material of which is admitted free. His lumber, his hay, his feed, his fuel, his all-staple and solid kinds, his farming machinery, is made, and made to the best advantage, out of the woods of his own country. The fuel grown in the forests which are all about him, or is found in the mines in inexhaustible quantities in the country. So that, taking it in the gross, in the rough, and special articles of consumption, and of housing, and of fuel for the farmer are those of which this country produces a surplus, which are free within the borders of this country and upon which not one cent of tax is paid. As hon. gentleman said, "What about the nails?" With that incidental case of iron and wire charcoal, comes him, out of the hundreds and thousands of dollars which are required to buy raw materials for the house, and which are free to the farmer who buys them, the hon. gentleman's mind leads him to look at the few pounds of nails which are necessary to keep the structure together, and upon which a duty may perhaps be paid. That argument, as an hon. gentleman suggests, is clinched.

No. 3 is the artisan. He does not live on a farm on which he is able to raise what he consumes, but he lives in a village or town, but the articles of food which he buys, the clothing which he wears, the lumber which he requires for house purposes, the furniture which he puts in his home, the tools which he uses to a large extent and the fuel he burns, which are the larger items in the expenditure of the artisan as well as in the expenditure of the farmer, are obtained in this country, which produces a surplus of them, and no duty is paid upon them. So, I say, that in this country with its present fiscal system and with its peculiar natural advantages, the system of tariff arrangement under which we live is one which brings the incidence of taxation where it should rest most heavily, upon the man who uses luxuries and has expensive tastes and is willing to gratify them, and least heavily upon the farmer, the well-to-do middleman and the artisan and upon the laboring class. The total value of the production of minerals of all kinds in Canada during last year was \$16,500,000.

The will of the late Thomas Workman directs that the sum of \$27,500 be distributed to Montreal charities.

The city officials, cemetery companies, undertakers and clergy of London have united in opposition to Sunday funerals.

The Grand Trunk authorities have determined to prosecute every person found walking on the Company's tracks.

Archbishop Tache's visit to Ottawa is believed to be in connection with the proposed Manitoba school legislation.

Roy & Co., the great Belgian iron and foundrymen, will establish works at St. Hyacinthe, Que., employing 400 men.

McGill University is to receive \$150,000, to be devoted to the study of applied sciences, under the will of the late Thomas Workman.

A census of the attendance at the Protestant churches at Ottawa was taken on Sunday evening. The figures are given as follows: The attendance of the churches in question are 15,000.

Some of the cattlemen saved from the wreck of the Geographic, who arrived in Montreal on Monday, charge the Captain of this vessel with acts of cruelty and inhumanity.

Sir Charles Tupper is on a visit to Spain and is believed to be inquiring as to the prospects of respecting transportation for a commercial treaty between Canada and that country.

The surveys and plans of the proposed Canadian Pacific railway extension through Hamilton are complete, and have been forwarded to Montreal for the approval of the directors.

Land Commissioner Hamilton says this has been a magnificent year for the sale of Canadian Pacific railway lands. The sales so far are in excess of last year, which exceeded the company's expectations.

Samuel Hilditch, a middle-aged Englishman, convicted of infanticide, and a 6-year-old child, received 25 lashes in the York N.S. jail Saturday. The "cat" used was borrowed from a man-of-war at Halifax.

Hon. A. Daves, Attorney General of Belgium, is at present in Montreal. He is on a visit to this country for the purpose of discussing the proposed extension of the establishment of a colony of Belgian settlers.

The wife of a Scotsman has reported to the Halifax Society for the Prevention of Cruelty that her husband frequently beats her with his clenched fist just at the base of the brain, which renders her stupid for a time and forgetful of everything that occurs afterwards, and that the great treatment leaves no tell-tale marks.

Clark & Keane, manufacturers of worsteds in Philadelphia, have assigned. They employed 500 hands.

Yagui Indians are reported to have killed two companies of Mexican soldiers, whom they thought to be Americans.

A Pittsburgh engineer is preparing a model of a bridge to span the Hudson River from Jersey City to New York.

Capt. Rishworth Jordan, who took part in the war of 1812, died at Southfield, Me., on Sunday, aged 95 years.

During the past two years ten men have been killed and twenty injured in New York city by electric light wires.

The Episcopal Convention in New York recently voted an appropriation of \$40,000 for mission work among the colored people.

The New York Board of Electrical Control has decided that there are about 500 miles of wire in the city not properly insulated and which should come down.

Another Quebec rock slide is said to be imminent at the place of the recent disaster. There is a huge rent in the cliff which is daily growing in size.

Mr. Frank Denton suggests the erection of a monument at Niagara on the one hundredth anniversary of the opening of Upper Canada's first Parliament.

Elections were held in Newfoundland on Wednesday, the voting being by ballot for the first time. Returns received indicate the defeat of the Government.

Magnificent catches of mackerel have been made off the shore of Halifax county, N. S. One thousand barrels, valued at \$15,000, were shipped to Boston on Saturday.

The city of Antioch Maloney and Harry Phillips, charged with stealing jewelry in Montreal, was again postponed on Tuesday as the Crown witnesses were absent.

Alfred Provencher, of the Montreal corporation, who has returned from an inspection of roadways in New York, London, and Paris, says that the use of macadam and wood is a waste of money.

Anderson, Anderson & Co., of the proposed steel steamship line, have written to the St. John board of trade enquiring as to the harbor there. From this it would appear that they have not abandoned the project.

Mr. Geo. Barnes, of Kemptville, while diving across the C. P. railway bridge on Frontenac road, on Monday, was thrown from his buggy by his horse running away. He struck on a stone and has been unconscious ever since.

AMERICAN.

Snowstorms have been raging for eight days in New Mexico, and the cattle ranches are losing heavily.

Very severe storms have prevailed in New Mexico, and a number of cowboys and sheep herders have been lost.

South-western Kansas has had a blizzard. Snow, hail and sleet kept the people in doors and delays in business.

The pretty daughter of John C. Lester, a Chicago millionaire, has eloped with young Paul Armour, of the same city.

Chinese in great numbers are arriving at Manzanillo, Mexico, and making their way thence to California and Arizona.

A Boston paper says there are 30,301 pupils in parochial schools there, while there are 178,097 in the public schools.

Nine lives are known to have been lost in the storm in New Mexico. No other men are missing. Another storm is raging.

A son of Jacob Bright, M. P., and nephew of the late Hon. John Bright, was among President Harrison's callers at Washington on Tuesday.

The anniversary of the execution of the Chicago Anarchists is celebrated at Pittsburgh, Pa., on Saturday night with great enthusiasm.

Ex-President Cleveland, referring to Tuesday's State elections, says it is evident that the leaves of tariff reform have last year's whole lot.

A dispatch from Fargo, N. D., says Frank Scott, a graduate of the University of Toronto, has been elected to the position of mayor of that city.

The valuable supply of wheat in the United States and Canada increased 1,130,000 bushels the past week, but stocks are about 7,000,000 bushels less than a year ago.

Kate Donovan, a Lawrence, Mass., seven-year-old daughter of John Donovan, was pushed into a bonfire on Thursday by her playmates and died during the night.

A salmon passenger on board the steamship Ryndland was taken with smallpox during the voyage to New York. The other cabin passengers were notified on arrival.

Miss Kate Drexel, the daughter of F. A. Drexel, the millionaire banker of Philadelphia, was on Thursday received into the Convent of St. Mary of Mercy in Pittsburgh, Pa.

A young negro named Owen Anderson was for a long time taken for a white man, and was killed by bullets by a Louisiana Va. mob for mistaking a white soldier.

At the Women's Christian Union in Chicago, it was admitted that to secure victory for the temperance cause Congress must be re-elected and state legislatures changed, which seems well-nigh impossible.

Some boys in Windsor found a box containing human bones and around the town. Subsequently a Detroit medical student, who boarded in Windsor, claimed the bones and took them away.

Mr. Caroline Donovan, of Baltimore, has presented Johns Hopkins University with the sum of \$100,000, which will be devoted to the establishment of a chair of English literature.

Charles Bolton and Alex. Kerr, brothers-in-law and farmers, of Southdown, Ill., fought a duel with pocket knives. Kerr was fatally injured.

Mr. Manda Morgan, said to be an important witness for the prosecution in the Cronin case, was kidnapped in Chicago by some unknown person on Friday night and is in a precarious condition.

President Harrison says that no administration in the first year can withstand the assaults of office seekers. He expressed the belief that no particularly concerned over the Democratic gains in the state elections.

At the convention of the W.G.T.U. held in Chicago, the diamond medal prize offered for victory was won by Daryl Stoddard, an 11-year-old girl from Chicago, who delivered an address on "Labor as a Religion."

Mr. William O'Brien made application recently for a new trial in his action for libel against Lord Salisbury.

The Baltimore steamer Queenmar was wrecked on the coast of Ireland, and her cargo, worth \$320,000, was lost.

The Pope is in an extreme state of feebleness, and he confidently expects his own death to occur at an early date.

Russian cavalry is being massed on the Austro-Hungarian frontier, and the Government of Austria is naturally very uneasy.

The Carver Hotel is to be married to Princess Helena of Montenegro, a very clever and beautiful girl, next January.

The hop crop of Europe this year is estimated at 102,000,000 pounds, and that of the United States at 35,000,000 pounds.

The Emperor of China, who married against his will, in obedience to his mother, refuses to see either his mother or his wife.

The master lightermen have conceded the demands of the striking dockmen, and another threatened long strike has been averted.

The St. Petersburg "Novoye Vremya" says there is good authority for the statement that Turkey has practically joined the triple alliance.

Prince Albert Victor of Wales, who is about to make a tour of India, has arrived in Bombay, and was given an enthusiastic reception.

The condition of affairs in Crete is improving, many prisoners have been released, and it is expected a general amnesty will soon be proclaimed.

The reported massacre of Dr. Peters' expedition has not been confirmed in Zanzibar, and pending confirmation the report is discounted.

The Hungarian Government has obtained control of 10,000 taverns throughout the country, many of which will be converted into school-houses.

Princess Marie, wife of Prince Alexander of Battenberg, died the other day at Graz, in childhood. She was the well-known opera singer, Mrs. Lohengrin.

Mr. John Morley, in reply to the Socialists at Newmarket, expressed his opinion that land nationalization and all such schemes are either folly or robbery.

Bongiorno's landlord has been warned by the local authorities in Jersey that he will be held responsible for any Bonaparte demonstrations taking place at his house.

It is ascertained from official figures that during the present year Italy has called into the various branches of her military service 150,000 more men than in any previous year.

American missionaries in Burma make complaint that the English Government has their salaries, although the funds for them are derived from the British treasury.

At the Lord Mayor's banquet at Guildhall recently Lord Salisbury delivered an address in which he congratulated the country upon the splendid expansion of its trade, and referred hopefully to the prospects of the future.

The Yellow river, China, is again far above the normal height, and a repetition of the floods of two years ago is feared. Crops are ruined, and great loss of life is imminent.

Five hundred families have been drowned as Wang Choo, and in one district 10,000 people are homeless. On the other hand, there is danger of famine from drought in Lo Kien province.

The Peter's Expedition.

The "Times" says:—"The gratification with which the civilized world has received the news of the safety of Stanley and Emin Pasha has been almost instantly damped by the intelligence that the adventurous German explorer, Dr. Peters, had been cut off on the River Tanzi by Maudslayi and his men."

Only two survivors of his party had reached Nyasa. Setting aside altogether questions of international rivalry in the regions of exploration and colonization, it would be unfair to deny to Peters the courage, the zeal and the energy which he displayed in his endeavors to open up Africa to European influences.

Immediately, of course, to those who follow the news of poor Peters' death and further details about Stanley and Emin Pasha about the public attention. The Berlin Pasha Relief Committee have commended the expedition, and the news has been received by the Foreign Office and are satisfied as to its authenticity. The news reached Berlin from London about noon.

The "Standard" says:—"Another distinguished name has been added to the gloomy death roll of African exploration and adventure. There is no room for hoping that the news of the massacre of Dr. Peters and the bulk of his party may prove like any other story of disaster that rumor has brought down the coast, the product of native exaggeration."

The circumstantial character of the account despatched from Loma to Zanzibar forbids the supposition in which under ordinary conditions it would be allowable to indulge.

The "22" says:—"Dr. Peters had an honored victim in his end in the service of the country. We can feel nothing but sorrow for the untimely death. Africa is wide enough for us and for those he served, and every pioneer of civilization in the wilderness is a pioneer for the entire race."

Dr. Peters has been denied the glorious fortune which has been reserved for Stanley, and which has been fairly won by the judgment, courage, and inexhaustible energy of that prince of explorers.

Curious Church Trial.

The Archdeacon of Canterbury recently suspended for one year the Vicar of Holy St. Werburgh, for refusing to admit to the communion of the Holy Communion to one of his parishioners, the wife of Dr. Swaine. Mrs. Swaine was a member of the Church of England, duly baptized, confirmed and married, according to its ceremonies. The alleged ground of the refusal was that Mrs. Swaine was in the habit of attending a Wesleyan place of worship.

In a letter to the press the Vicar described Mrs. Swaine's son as "a wilful rebel," and said that nothing would induce him to give the Holy Communion to one who expressed no regret for those sins and gave no promise of abandoning them. The Judge said that his decision would not preclude the Court from considering any application that the respondent might make, if he could show that Mrs. Swaine was not a member of the Church.

At the convention of the W.G.T.U. held in Chicago, the diamond medal prize offered for victory was won by Daryl Stoddard, an 11-year-old girl from Chicago, who delivered an address on "Labor as a Religion."

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NEW GUINEA'S NEW GOVERNOR.

Mr. William MacGregor was a Famous Character in the South Seas.

Mr. William MacGregor is probably the most pushing and enterprising man among British "new" colonial Governors. He is only forty-three years of age, and after seeing his medical diploma at Aberdeen in 1874, he entered the colonial service as surgeon, and became assistant Government medical officer at the Seychelles in the Indian Ocean.

Subsequently he became superintendent of the island, and medical officer at the hospital at Port Louis in the Mauritius. He went to Fiji as chief medical officer under Sir Arthur Gordon towards the latter end of 1875, where he soon tired of doing out of his pocket of his pocket for the natives, and he was transferred to the island of New Guinea, where he was appointed Governor in 1884.

When the Spitz, a labor bark, was wrecked on Niasal Reef, near Suva, in 1884, with some six hundred coolie laborers from India on board, he commanded the police boats and native canoes at the rescue, and worked through a terrible night with a heroism which has seldom been paralleled. When all the others had to give in from exhaustion he insisted again and again to the wreck, and succeeded in saving some seventy lives himself. For his conspicuous gallantry on this occasion he was awarded the Albert and Clarke medals. It is not surprising, considering his character, that he should have been a member of the House of Commons, to hear that Sir William MacGregor carried the heaviest "swag" of any man in the party which recently performed the journey to the summit of Mount Owen Stanley.

How to Care For and Preserve Your Watch.

To wind a Stem Wind Watch, grip firmly with thumb and forefinger the Crown or Right steadily until you feel resistance.

To set the hour, grip part as above described, draw out or move from the Watch until you hear the Stem click, or find it give, then turn the hands backwards or forwards. Do not be afraid of this operation, as you will hurt nothing.

To regulate, open the back case, then the Cap or inside cover, and then the case, as movements are often broken, the result of using an awkward tool, which is allowed to slide into the movement, then notice Index Plate over Balance, or at point of Regulation, you will find the levers S. and P. If you desire the watch to run slow, move the Regulator towards S; or if you desire it to run fast, move it towards P.

A VERY COMMON TROUBLE.

Should your watch suddenly gain time, perhaps at the rate of an hour per day or more, the cause will probably be a sudden jar or fall, which has disturbed the escapement or overlapping the hairspring. In this case do not attempt to regulate it, as this would be impossible. Open the back case, and with a clean point or pin draw lightly over the hairspring, using care not to force or damage the watch, then set to time and allow regular time.

PREVENTIVES IN WINDING.

Wind regularly, as it insures better time and less chance of breakage to Mainpring. Better keep your watch running, than allow it to stand idle, as the oil becomes set and hard, and may not start when wanted.

POSTION.

Wind your Watch every day at about the same hour. Avoid carrying it on a metal chain, or near anything which would produce a magnetic field. Avoid carrying it near a magnet, or near a strong electric current. Avoid carrying it near a strong magnetic field.
