SAD DROWNING ACCIDENT.

Friday evening one of the saddest accidents ever experienced in Lachute happened in the North River, a little above the residence of W. D. Cooke. Three young men, named respectively Wm. Fielding, Alfred Barker and William Barker went into battle at about 7:30. The latter, William Barker, getting into deep water and being unable to swim a flood for assistance, Fielding went in and succeeded in getting hold of the drowning man, whose brother standing in the shallow water at the side, seized Fielding's hand, but unfortunately at this moment, his footing gave way and all three went into about 12 feet of water. Fielding succeeded in freeing himself from the grasp of the deceased, and with Alfred Barker reached the bank in a terribly exhausted condition. Poor William Barker sank and was drowned. As soon as the alarm was given assistance was obtained and about an hour elapsed before the body was recovered, when although vigorous attempts were made to resuscitate, it was soon found that life was extinct. The funeral took place on Sunday and was largely attended. The deceased was in the employ of J. C. Wilson & Co. He therefore leaves behind a young widow who has the sympathy of the whole town in her great bereavement.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

SEALED TENDERS addressed to the undersigned and enclosed in the envelope of the St. Lawrence Canals will be received at this office, until the arrival of the eastern and western mails on Wednesday the 23rd day of July next, for the construction of a lock, lock weirs, etc. at Morrisburg and the deepening and enlargement of the Rapide Plat Canal. The work will be divided into three sections, each about a mile in length.

A map of the locality, together with plans and specifications of the respective works, can be seen on and after Wednesday, the 9th day of July next, at this office, and at the Resident Engineer's Office, Morrisburg, where printed forms of tender can be obtained.

In the case of firms there must be attached to the tender, the actual signatures of the firm, the nature of the occupation and residence of each member of the same, and, further, an accepted cheque on a chartered bank in Canada for the sum of \$6,000, must accompany the tender for Section No. 1, and an accepted cheque on a chartered bank in Canada, for the sum of \$2,000 for each of the other sections.

The respective accepted cheques must be endorsed over to the Minister of Railways and Canals, and will be forfeited if the party tendering declines entering into contract for the works at the rates and on the terms stated in the offer submitted. The cheques thus sent in will be returned to the respective parties whose tenders are not accepted. This Department does not, however, bind itself to accept the lowest or any tender.
