A very senseless and dangerous trick was played by some boys on Friday last, about eleven o'clock at night. The corporation have sublet the Larmouth buildings to Chapman & Drysdale. In last week's *Independent* an attempt was made to place the responsibility of the blunder of having two buildings on the old councilors and their late, Secretary. Some time ago Mr. Larmouth wanted to sell the property as he had a good offer, but the council took advantage of the law of the law contained in the lease and refused him the privilege. Can it be expected that he should forego his rights now?
