WOMEN'S RIGHTS.

The people of Waterloo are certainly not tainted with medievalism but seem to be far in advance of sister villages or towns in this province. They are now before the Legislature seeking incorporation as a town and they ask that in addition to those persons privileged to vote at general elections, mentioned in the general Act of Incorporation, that unmarried women and widows be allowed to become municipal electors on the same conditions as apply to men. It will be noticed the men of Waterloo have assumed that married women are under the control of their husbands, and consequently to give them a vote, would simply be placing two votes in the hands of married men. Whether or no the assumption is based on fact, the ladies themselves are the best judges. But this goes further. It permits unmarried women and widows to be elected as School Commissioners. And here comes the funny part of the act, which confirms us in the belief that the town fathers of Waterloo are exceedingly anxious that the scriptural command to wives to be obedient to their husbands should not be violated. Married women are permitted to be members of the school board, but only with the consent of their husbands. That consent is assumed by the law, but should any husband file an objection to his wife's nomination or election either at the time of election or within fifteen days after, such nomination or election is null and void and another candidate must be chosen. This effect of this experiment on the educational institution of Waterloo will be watched with some interest.

THE VAUDREUIL ELECTION.

The return of the Conservative candidate in Vaudeuil is rather surprising and must cause a feeling of disappointment if not of apprehension among the followers of Mr. Mercier. At the general election, when the forces of the government were scattered over the whole province, when their possession of the treasury benches was only problematic, when the money for legal expenses was necessarily limited, owing to the large number of counties requiring this aid, when everything was in doubt, the Mercier candidate carried the county against the late member. Now, after the government being firmly established, with no other election pending to draw from the united efforts of the leaders and their legal tender, with all the prestige of former victory, the government candidate has been beaten. True the majority is very small, and one which the vagaries of the law may possibly turn into a minority, but it is such as to denote a strong feeling against the government. It seems that the chief question discussed with the electors was the proposed loan that Mr. Mercier is about to make. If we are to believe in the theory of responsible government, this must be taken as a direct condemnation of the vicious extravagance practiced at Quebec. There is some hope for the province if the people are awakened to the sense of our danger and the swiftness with which that most unpopular system of raising money is coming upon us, namely, direct taxation. In fact the amount of direct provincial taxation collected in an indirect way from the farmers is quite sufficient to cause a revolution against the government, when the facts are appreciated, as they have been no doubt to some degree by the Vaudeuil electors. The commercial corporation tax, the license tax, the auctioneers' tax, and a host of other sources of revenue of which Mr. Mercier has taken advantage, come indirectly out of the pockets of the farmers, although collected directly from the business community. The government organs are continually pointing out to the farmers that the largest portion of the taxation falls upon the inhabitants of the cities. While the money is collected from the cities, the farmers pay it into the cities and it is produced by their hard labor. This was the first opportunity the people had to express their opinion on the loan. They have done so, and their condemnation should cause Mr. Mercier to reflect seriously if he can afford to place a load of debt on the shoulders of this province without the consent of the electorate. Had he desired to act honestly with the people, the proposition for a loan of such a large amount, should have been brought down at the last session of the legislature, and then the whole province would have been in a position to pronounce upon it at the general elections.

To the Editor of THE WATCHMAN.

DEAR SIR:—As I told you in my last I will now give you an idea of our valley's topographical aspect and future prospects. Looking down south, about six miles distant, we see Antler Hill rising majestically with its slopes adorned by bluffs and glades. To the east, runs a range of hills very picturesque in summer garb of poplar, spruce and cotton wood, away to the north, stretch a series of elevated spruce bluffs. Over to the west, run the cool crystal waters of the Red Deer, while back in the distance, glistening in the rays of the morning sun, we can gaze upon the solemn, snow encrusted, peaks of the Rocky Mountains.

Imagine then a valley about ten miles long and six wide, variegated by groves and meadows green; with lakes and willow brake lying between. These lakes are the rendezvous of numerous flocks of geese and ducks, while, over the prairie skim myriads of chickens, feeding on the wild pea which very plentifully abounds here. The chickens are quite fat now and are very nice roasted or fried, which is the proper method of cooking them. The soil is a rich, black mould, some places over two feet in depth, with a clay subsoil, when the soil is broken and rotted it is soft and as easily worked as a rich vegetable garden. They are learning here that a fair crop can be got off the spring breaking, when the season and everything is favorable the yield is a tonishing. I am not going to say just now how much, or you might think in this big country a fellow learns to tell big stories. I admit that summer frosts have been a great discouragement. In the past, but I think I may safely without being called an enthusiast that they are bound to disappear in a country like this with its glorious autumn weather. The inhabitants of Quebec Province would rejoice and be glad if they could pursue their daily avocations in shirt sleeves and wearing straw hats as we can do here now. We had a cold spurt, with a flurry of snow on the 8th but again since that it has been like summer. Old residents say it is likely to continue like this up till Christmas.

When the ground is broken up so as to receive heat from the sun during the day, this heat will radiate at night and prevent frosts, or at least, modify them. I may venture to say, that out of the 40,000 acres in this valley around us, the has not been 300 acres yet turned over. This valley is only a minute portion of the virgin soil awaiting the toil of the husbandman. This country wants men of capital to give it a start. Les Gaez one of the pioneer settlers, has placed 1200 acres of land at the disposal of the railway company; the greater portion of which has been surveyed into town lots and will be placed on the market next spring.

On July 21st the first aid of the Calgary, & Edmonton Railway, was on Ken—about five miles down an engine is now standing while her cargo of rails is being unloaded, a distance of nearly ninety miles has been ironed in that short space of time.

I am certain Providence never meant such a beautiful country and grand soil, to lie forever fettered in bonds of frost, and it requires no prophetic vision, to be able to say, that in the near future, some of the readers of your esteemed paper may be gliding northward over the Calgary and Edmonton Road, through a verdant and fertile land, richly laden with the fruits of the soil.

There has been a tremendous influx here since August, and in all this little valley I have described, I don't think there are a dozen vacant sections open for home-stead. The kind of man to get along here, if he is poor is one who will wrestle and surmount difficulties by honest toil—not the man who pokes his nose into his neighbor's affairs, tries to blast the reputation of his fellow-men—travels around exchanging scandal with those who are not being clean themselves are glad to get some other person to sling dirt at and leaves his wife left alone at night, tend the cattle or hoe the corn, if he is a man, with capital he can invest in stock and go right in for big gains, raising cattle, steers and colts rustle here all winter.

We sometimes have a variation to break the monotony of bachelor life, I was sitting building arial castles in the dark, night before last when all at once I heard a fearful clearing and noise, I thought it was going to be an Indian massacre, there being an encampment close by. The door was kicked open and John swept in like a tornado, white and terror stricken and gasped, "a bear! a bear!" Will went with him to look but I presume he got such a fright he won't call again. In John's version, as he turned the corner of the stable after milking the cow, the light flashed on some dark object which gave a snort, John looked, he saw and he was amazed; for not thirty feet away a huge bear was going to look in the haystack. John says he thinks he never covered so much ground in the same time before. I'll tell you.

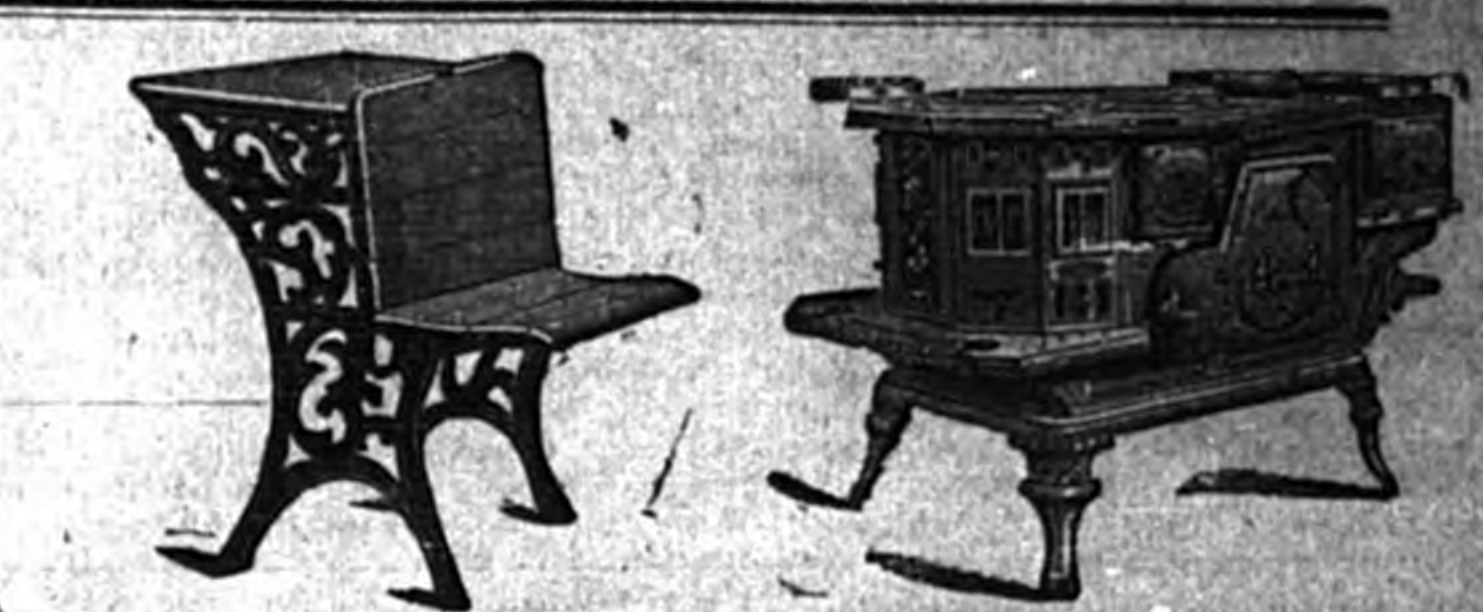

A new iron foundry and a mill factory are to be established at St. John, N. B.

On Saturday one Victoria, B. C., Chinaman cut another's head off with a knife.

The lumber cut of the Ottawa valley this season is put down at close on 600,000,000 feet.

Thomas Watson, a Waterloo veteran, now living in Ottawa, claims to be in his 103rd year.

The Kingston Equal Rights Association has reorganized with Rev. Dr. Jackson as president.

It is proposed to introduce a bill in the Quebec Legislature to provide for compulsory voting.

Our Ottawa despatch states that Parliament will not be called together until the end of February.

It is said that \$50,000 worth of stock in the proposed York County Bank has been taken in Montreal.

During the past three months city property worth to the value of \$3,000,000 has been stolen from Ottawa.

At Lacolle, Que., on Saturday a Innkeeper named Fournival killed his wife by cutting her throat with a razor.

G. B. Biglow, at present serving a term in the Kingston penitentiary for bigamy, has had 60,000 left him by his first wife.

A Newfoundland officer seized a French schooner from St. Pierre for smuggling and had somewhat of a "tussle" with her crew.

Mr. S. J. Ritchie, of Akron, Ohio, who is at present in Ottawa, says he is confident of the value of the nickel deposits in Sudbury.

A portion of the Cathedral of St. Alban the Martyr, Toronto, has been finished. The cathedral when completed will cost \$200,000.

The manager of the Kingston cotton mill urges the shareholders to refuse the offer of \$175,000 for the mill made by the eastern syndicate.

The Toronto Retail Grocers' Association have decided to request their customers not to purchase goods from manufacturers who form combines.

Dr. Clark, M. P. for Cathiness in the Imperial Parliament, was tendered a welcome by the Toronto Cathiness and Gaelic societies on his arrival.

Sir John Macdonald last week laid the corner stone of the McLeod street Methodist church in Ottawa, and made one of his characteristic speeches.

Henry T. Pearson, an English lad of eleven, was taken with a Royal Humane Society medal at Toronto for the saving of two boys from drowning.

The visiting members of the British Iron and Steel Institute left Montreal on Monday for Boston, when they proceeded to New York en route for England.

The railway companies, and the Buffalo railway have at last commenced operations in earnest in Hamilton, and public confidence in the scheme has been restored.

Frank Dupuis, aged 19, clerk in the I.C. R. office, Montreal, N. B., was instantly killed by a passing train the other day. The young man was on the tracks.

The shipment of timber of all kinds from the St. Lawrence ports this year is only 323, 660, 099, against 351, 313, 573 feet in 1889, being a decrease of 27, 652, 574 feet.

Mr. Donald MacMaster, the well-known Queen's counsel, of Montreal, was married yesterday to Miss Ella De Ford, of Baltimore, at the home of the bride in that city.

Commissioner Adam Brown says some 60 Canadian cities and towns will be represented at the Jamaica exhibition, and that the same will be the case with the Dominion will be very complete.

A retaliatory measure the authorities of Victoria, B. C., have placed a license fee of \$50 on all commercial travellers from the United States, and this fee will be increased to \$115 0 after next January.

Mr. Foster, Minister of Finance, left Ottawa yesterday for New York, to take the steamer for the West Indies, to see what prospects there are of opening markets for Canadian goods in that direction.

Sir John Thompson has caused a circular to be issued to all the judges in Canada, as well as to the Attorney-General of each province, asking their views as to the advisability of abolishing the grand jury system.

At Westport, Ont., on Tuesday evening a tailor named McKevett was singing at a social when he fell over and died from heart disease. He came recently from Maple Lake, Rhode Island, and was an exemplary man.

A Montreal despatch tells of the resignation of Mr. A. Boyer, who defeated Hon. Mr. Tallon in the late election in Jacques Cartier, Que. The cause is said to be the fact that Mr. Boyer was not taken into the cabinet as promised.

Mr. T. P. Gill, M. P., who has the management of the tour of the representatives of the Irish Parliamentary party, says he is after the American programme killed McKim, O'Brien and Dillon will visit Canada, arrest or no arrest.

The steamship Linda, Montreal to New castle, lost 300 cattle crossing the Atlantic. It is also rumored in Montreal that the remainder of her cargo of cattle were quarantined in the harbor, and that the remainder but that is likely only another "scare" story.

Premier Mercier's announcements in the Quebec Legislature on Friday, that the policy of the Government would be to place the lunatic asylums under State control, has created a great sensation throughout the province, and some indignation among the Ultramontanes.

Archdeacon Lander, who has returned to Ottawa from a trip to Ireland, says he saw signs of prosperity in every direction. Lander is highly complimentary to the Government. The failure of the potato crop was grossly exaggerated, and altogether the outlook in the Archdeacon's eyes is remarkably bright and cheering.

At a meeting of the directors of the Toronto Industrial Exhibition Association held last week, the directors of the Association decided that the total receipts during the exhibition of 1890 were \$34,700 and the expenses \$69,000. In the previous year the total receipts were \$75,200, and the expenses \$65,000.

GREAT BRITAIN.

A slight earthquake was felt in Monmouthshire on Saturday.

On Sunday the Prince of Wales entered upon his half-century year.

The British newspapers over Zanzibar have recently proclaimed.

The new underground electrical railway in London was opened on Monday.

The Earl of Aberdeen has reached home and has very kind words for Canada.

A farmer named O'Mahoney was four murdered by the roadside at Sennell, Ireland.

At a mass meeting of railway employees Greenock it was resolved to strike for shorter hours.

Full returns of the municipal elections in England show a Liberal gain of 97 and a Conservative loss of 66.

The premises of *Truth* (Mr. Labouchere's paper) in Fleet street, London, were destroyed by fire on Monday.

Lord Chief Justice Coleridge has been seized with an apoplectic or paralytic stroke, and his condition is critical.

Secretary Balfour's only excitement so far in his Donagel tour was a short verbal contest with Mr. McNeil, M. P.

The Central Chambers of Agriculture in England have adopted a resolution declaring the necessity of keeping up the embargo on American cattle.

It is understood that the syndicate of Western men has leased from the Government the contract for the Canadian fast Atlantic steamships.

The London *Chronicle* holds that the friendly reception accorded to Mr. Balfour in Ireland shows that the Parnellites do not represent the Irish people.

The Comte de Paris has arrived at Stowe, where he has leased from the Duchesse of Buckingham. The mayor and corporation gave the Comte a public reception.

The London *Times*, commenting upon the result of the elections in the States, says it will not be easy for the Democrats to find a presidential candidate than Mr. McLean Cleveland.

At an early hour on Monday morning, the English Great Western railway, by the carelessness of a signalman, an express ran into a freight train, causing the death of ten persons and the injury of eight.

The London *Daily News* says if Bonny is unable to substitute one-tenth of what he has lost, Stanley will be completely justified, and it will only remain to ascertain when Major Bartlett became a maniac.

The Welsh delegates sent to the United States to investigate tin plate interests have returned home and reported that the investigation has been a failure, as the tin plate interests in the States are widely distributed.

Mr. Goschen, Chancellor of the Exchequer speaking at Halifax last week, denied that the bye-elections proved that the cause of Unionism was a failure. A few services at the end of the war were not going to determine the issue of a great campaign.

Newfoundland's representatives have left England, with the French shore difficulty far from being settled. A London rumor now has it that France will demand the return of New Brunswick, the price of the abandonment of her rights in Newfoundland.

Mr. Bancroft, the old English actor, has offered to donate £1,000, if ninety-nine others will each subscribe a like amount, for the cause of the London General Booth.

With the money necessary to make a trial of this scheme for the improvement of the London poor.

UNITED STATES.

Heavy snow has fallen in the Northwest corn States.

The trunk line presidents and Central Union Association representatives have restored rates to last year's figures.

An outbreak of diptheria in Martinsville, Ind., is attributed to cats which carried the infection from one family to another.

The total Indian population of the United States is 250,000, while the area occupied by them is about 182,250 square miles.

The Chicago packers of canned meats have admitted advancing prices, possibly to counteract the loss of the cans under the new tariff.

The corner-stone of the Chicago Masonic temple, which will cost over two million dollars, was laid last week with imposing ceremonies.

Mr. Cummings, colored, Republican, has been elected to the Baltimore city council. He is the first colored man ever elected to office in Baltimore.

It is stated that the purchase of several dead beef and pork packing-houses in New York City by the syndicate has been practically consummated.

The New York *Tribune* concedes the Democrats a majority of at least 120 in the next House of Representatives, and their papers estimate as high as 150.

Since the last time the United States treasury department has paid out \$20,000,000, it has been a record, meaning a reduction of the surplus to that extent.

An election day duel took place in Lexington, Ky., in which the two principals and a brother of one of them were killed and three onlookers seriously wounded.

Judgments aggregating \$676,121 were entered by default in New York on Monday for failure to pay the Malboroughs.

They were returned marked "no effects."

Suici, the Italian starvation expert, is practicing his vocation in New York. He had up to Wednesday night fasted 168 hours and lost twenty-three pounds.

It appears there are a number of Canadian immigrants in New York, Y., including the Ontario, who are trying to get into the country in their case the United States Alien Labor law.

The state board of agriculture of Ohio has received reports of an epidemic of cholera among hogs in several counties of the state in which the swine are dying in large numbers.

The prize herd of Berkshire hogs, owned by M. K. Price & Son, of Okaloosa, Iowa, has been nearly destroyed by cholera. Within two weeks 100 hogs, valued at \$1,000, have died.

It is suggested that the American anthracite coal ring can be broken as far as Canada is concerned by the importation of Welsh anthracite, which can be laid down at Montreal for \$4.75 a ton.

The White Star and Inman Steamship Companies have decided that there shall be no competition between their passenger steamers, and it is expected the other companies will join in the agreement.

A despatch from Salt Lake City says: Notwithstanding President Woodruff's proclamation polygamy still flourishes in Utah. Forty-two arrests have been made for the crime in the last day.

Painted Horse, one of Buffalo Bill's Red Cloud Indians, has arrived in New York from Europe, and charges Buffalo Bill and Dr. Carver with great cruelty towards the Indians under their charge.

The London *Standard* has received from the famine in Ireland has issued a circular with drawing requests for American money and clothing, as great Britain has practically promised to see that no famine shall exist.

A travelling showman having filled a large hall in Birmingham, England, with children and a large number of men, women and children, and a present with every ticket, deliberately lighted a crackling match and gave an alarm of fire, which resulted in a fearful panic. The showman and his wife were arrested.

A scheme is being promoted in Chicago to build a "cattle car" for the purpose of carrying cattle with Lake Ontario, so that grain can be sent from Chicago to Liverpool without breaking bulk at Lakes Michigan, Superior and Huron, through Georgian Bay to Lake Ontario, and thence to the St. Lawrence. The railway would cost about \$12,000,000.

IN GENERAL.

A man and his wife who with the assistance of their son went to death, a man found with their daughter in her bedroom were acquitted by a Paris jury on Friday.

A bull fight took place in the City of Mexico before an immense audience on Sunday, and because the fighting was no desperate enough the spectators became so angry that the bull was killed in which the place was completely wrecked.

A special cablegram says a special meeting of the Imperial Federation League was held in London last week at which praise was given to the "wise and patriotic utterances of the Canadian statesman." Gen. Laurier, the Dominion Premier, addressed the meeting, and said that the only way to build up a united Empire was by universal trade methods.

Gloomy Week in London.—Loss of the Barquentine—The Stanley Scandal.

It has been a gloomy week indeed, a gloomy one for almost all sorts and conditions of men. The panic in the City came near ending in a catastrophic epoch such this generation hardly seems to see. Everybody knows what great financial houses stood for days tottering on the brink of utter ruin, though nobody can say it. The disaster was averted by the Bank of England and the co-operation of some leading firms. The bank itself was reduced to borrowing gold from the Bank of France.

Experts in finance say that the bank authorities have acted regardless of tradition with rare courage and sagacity. Thanks to them, the worst is believed to be over.

That is far from being the only matter which has agitated the public mind. I shall refer to the Stanley dispute later, but here we must mention the terrible wreck of horrors. There comes an awful railway collision, with the loss of ten lives and many injured. It occurred in circumstances which shake public confidence in the whole system. It appears that no perfection of engine or of machinery is a guarantee against most frightful accidents. An instant's forgetfulness on the part of a signalman, and the mischief is done. Other so-called accidents, however, are preventable, and the public will insist still is in a habit of looking at the torpedo cruiser *Serpent*, on the coast of Spain. A new ship, full-powered, hull-manned and skillfully officered, steered straight on a reef at mid-night in a gale; and three hundred lives were lost.

The Stanley scandal engaged English attention during the early part of the week to the exclusion of almost everything else. The long statements cable-d to "The Times" from Mr. Stanley, the long statement by Mrs. Stanley, the comments from the press, the comments from and by many other persons were read with painful avidity. London has breakfasted on horrible advice morning. The scandal soon assumed European proportions. It is now a subject of conversation in Vienna. Stanley is hated—*odé* of Vienna began to discuss it. Soon it came to be felt that there was no longer a personal controversy between Mr. Stanley and James, one and two-faced man, Hartstool and Jansoon, on the other side of the border and name of England, himself were at issue; or, as some said, his civilization itself. The demand that the dispute should be taken into the courts was followed at once by a demand for a Parliamentary inquiry. The name of the *Times* was very seriously pressed. There is readerly tribunal, the press; and "The Times," which has taken a striking lead in this business, began yesterday the publication of documents relating to the case. Yet one of them, which Mr. Stanley wisely placed at its disposal. Meantime it must be said that a great mass of prejudice had accumulated against Mr. Stanley.

Don't be for Gunners.

Don't fraternize with that brother gunner who is perpetually changing the position of his gun when carrying it.

Don't ever swing the gun on game if by doing so you pass points of danger. The finger is usually on the trigger and may by accident slip off and shoot at the wrong moment and kill somebody.

Don't point the weapon—be it gun, rifle or revolver—at any object except that at which you aim for the purpose of hitting your mark. Every week's papers prove the necessity for this rule, which is as simple as "don't drink."

Don't fire at a bird flying low unless all is clear in front beyond at least 200 yards (for a shot gun and absolutely clear for a rifle). Sir Ralph Pleydell Galway, in a letter to Young Shooters, says he has known a wing of eagles seriously damaged by shots at 191 yards.

Don't omit to keep a sharp watch on your companion who prides himself on being "snap shot." He commonly fires at everything that moves and will bring you down one of these days if you keep his company. Fearing to lag you the best dog is the next best thing.

Don't forget always take a general view of the locality before firing even at the legitimate object. This will save a few accidents if pursued by all shooters, and stand for a good rule, perhaps, avoid shooting at a deer or a dear friend behind some such obstacle.

Don't forget to extract your cartridges when climbing fences, crossing rough places and crawling through a hedge or other obstruction. You can load again in a second if you do not. If you do not, you run the risk—you may fall or slip, and the loaded gun is no respecter of persons.

Don't omit all possible precautions for safety. Aim rather to be a safe, sagacious gunner than a brilliant one. The reputation you can keep as long as you can live, but your life, perhaps, is worth more than that.

Don't allow any obstruction, such as snow mud, etc., to clog the muzzle of your gun. Such obstructions are compressed by the force of the powder gas, and the result is the bursting of a bolt. Look through your barrels before loading for the day's shooting, and if you have a misfire, also look or blow through them.

Don't carry the gun in your hand. The far away safest position is close to your shoulder and pointing downwards.

The position is, of course, for the same reason when you do not expect to use the gun very often. At other times carry it on the arm, muzzle pointing front. When standing and waiting for a shot, hold the butt against the right thigh, muzzles up.

High Toned Jockeys.

Our readers may be surprised to know that nowadays nearly every horse jockey at the big race-meetings in the United States has his man-servant or valet. As many of the jockeys are light as air, and their weight is kept up in the stalls and are noted for elaborate attire when in the street, it may be difficult at first for a layman to understand what use they have for man-servants. But the instances of jockeys having heavy overcoats after the races, and usually very busy personages in the rooms where the weighing is done just before the race. Most of the servants are much older than the men or boys who employ them, and the latter have been made to have the jockeys, valets put under public scrutiny. It is stated with a good deal of force, and the statements are endorsed by many prominent figures, that the bookmakers and gamblers have been able to do some of the dirtiest work, and that the schemes which are put up for the purpose of securing the balance and in which the jockeys appear to play prominent parts, are made possible only by the connivance of these servants.

It is announced from New York, that the White Star and Inman Steamship Companies have decided that there shall be no ocean racing between their steamers, and that the other companies are expected to join in the decision. It is a very probable and deplorable news. It may be possible, however, that the majority of the travelling public will approve of the decision. A boat of having made a passage in the shortest time, and without accident, is a very valuable talk afterwards, but the thoughtful and prudent person will not fail to perceive that the risks involved are too great for the advantage gained.

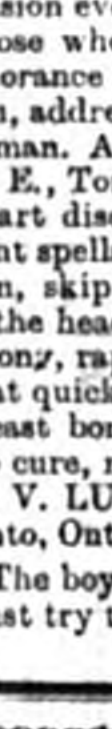
