SIR JOHN APPEALS TO THE PEOPLE.

March 25th. Polling Day.

There is now no parliament in Canada, the Governor General having dissolved the House on Tuesday last. The Government party are already hard at work and even their opponents concede that the chances for their maintenance in power are at least two to one. The reason assigned for this step is that a commission has been appointed to treat with the United States concerning trade relations, the fisheries question etc., and any arrangement that may be made, must receive the approval of the Canadian Parliament. As the new parliament will be fresh from the people they will better represent Canadian sentiment on the question. The Liberals are now trying to create the impression that this is an attempt on the part of Sir John to steal the Liberal policy of Unrestricted Reciprocity *alias* Commercial Union. A robber generally steals that which is of some value to the owner and of more value to himself, but in this case Sir John is represented as stealing a policy he would not own, and one that will be the means of keeping Sir Richard Cartwright, his father, out of power. We challenge any public man in Canada to point out a single word in any speech of Sir John Macdonald, in which he expressed a determination not to treat with the United States for closer trade relations, that would be of benefit to Canada; but he has always maintained that to give all and get nothing, to submit to have our tariff arranged by a foreign nation, to discriminate against Great Britain in favor of United States, to become separated from the mother country, to drop like a ripe apple into the lap of our neighbors, to lose our identity as a people and a nation and drift into annexation, would be a policy worthy only of traitors, and against the sentiment of true and loyal Canadians. Steal the Liberal policy, forsooth! As well steal poison and die from the effects thereof, for if Sir John Macdonald advocated the suicidal policy of Commercial Union, his political death would be insured.

In Argenteuil the contest, if there is to be one, has not yet opened. The Conservative party and Association is under a very superior organization. The constitution provides that immediately upon the seat becoming vacant it shall be the duty of the President to call a convention of delegates for the selection of a candidate. Mr. Fish, the president, has issued these notices to the various Vice Presidents in each section, appointing Tuesday Feb. 10th, inst., as the time for holding local meetings in each district at which there shall be appointed three delegates for each polling subdivision to attend a general convention to be held in Oliver Hall, Lachute, Thursday Feb. 12th, inst. at 2 p.m., at which the Conservative Candidate will be selected. These local meetings should be well attended by the Conservatives of the county, as through these they have an opportunity of making their wishes known at the larger Convention on the 12th inst. All these district meetings will be held at the same time, viz. Tuesday Feb. 10th, at 7 p.m. in the following places: Parish of St. Jerome and Lachute Town in Oliver Hall, St. Andrews Village and Parish in Town Hall St. Andrews, Carleton, at Kelly's Hotel, Front of Chatham and St. Philippe at St. Philippe Hotel, Road of Chatham and Brownburg at Warwick's school house, Grenville Village and Township. Augmentation at Avoca, Harrington, Lost River and Laurel at Bureh's Hotel Lost River, Arundel, Wentworth at Nell's school house, Cove, at the Orange Hall Lakefield, Mills Lake, Morin at Orange Hall Morin, Flats.

ANOTHER CONTEMPT OF COURT.

When a newspaper has insulted the Bench and made remarks which the Court held to be against the proper administration of justice, has been called to account therefor, has gone on its knees, eaten humble pie, apologized and paid, or caused to be paid, a moderate bill of costs, it would be expected that the punishment would have some effect and deter the offender from again publishing statements derogatory to the dignity of the Bench and tending to lessen public confidence in the administration of justice. The *Independent* has a bad memory. In last issue, a leading article printed in large type, declares that the administration of the law by Judge Taché was in a certain case, was one of a number of "travesties of justice," which has done more harm than anything that has ever been said to bring the administration of justice at Ste. Scholastique into contempt. After saying that the court "inferred" a fact not proven, viz. that the petitioners had not paid their tax, as an excuse to dismiss the petition, the article goes on to say "that the only hope for suffering taxpayers is at the elections, as they need not look for protection from the court." Thus the court brings into contempt. The following statement will be read with some interest by the unfortunate petitioners: "On behalf of the rest of the community a number of the more public spirited of the taxpayers agreed to petition the courts for redress." We have been informed by several of the petitioners that they

never agreed to any such thing, that the action was entered without their consent. Nevertheless they will be compelled to foot a bill of costs, for the privilege of being the "more public spirited taxpayers."

THE CALL TO ARMS.

At any time a Government which has been so loyal and steadfast to the best interests of Canada as has the Administration of Sir John Macdonald, which has been far-seeing and wise and prudent in the conduct of affairs to a remarkable degree, could appeal to the people and await with absolute certainty a favorable result, could call upon the members of the great Liberal-Conservative party to rally once more to the cause that has been so often carried to victory, and to the Leader whose genius and unflinching judgment have rendered incalculable service to the nation. But there are at the present time additional and weighty reasons why the Government of Canada rests assured not only of support of its party, but why it properly looks to patriotic men of all classes and opinions, who love their country before their personal views, to shake themselves free, if need be, from the ties of old cherished traditions, and cast their votes for a Government whose policy is coincident with national honor and independence, as well as national progress and prosperity, and against that of a party given over to the most traitorous course that infatuated politicians have ever dared to follow.

The Government of Sir John Macdonald can point in its twelve continuous years of exercise of the administrative function to a record inspiring to every patriotic man; it has kept in force a National Policy protecting every interest, and of vital and tangible benefit to farmer, to merchant, to workman, to manufacturer; it has enabled the farmer in a period of world-wide agricultural depression to establish himself in a better condition than his competitors in any other country in the world; the manufacturer has been given his home-market and the workman employment; it has built the great Canadian Pacific Railway from ocean to ocean, and given as a grasp of the trade Occident; it has built up the towns and cities of the country till they rival the marvellous growths of the American Republic; and its international policy has been as sound as its domestic, for in all the difficulties that have arisen in one way or another the Dominion has had behind it the cordial and powerful support of the Imperial authorities. While devoted to Canadian interests, it has at the same time cemented the bonds of British connection, and secured for the Dominion the influential and practical friendship of the Motherland to an extent never attained before.

On the other hand, what is the alternative presented by the Opposition to the Canadian elector. The policy of commercial union, or virtual absorption into the United States, the discrimination against the trade of our fellow Britons, the commercial restriction of Canada to one market, the destruction of our native industries, the introduction of direct taxation, the crushing of our political independence, and the annulling out of our national existence. Such a platform is not alone a menace to all Canadian holders dear, but it is a direct insult to the loyal Conservatives and Liberals of the country, who are not prepared to give up their birthright for a mess of pottage, and it is, therefore, for no slight reason that the Government of Canada appeals to those myriads of loyal Reformers whose faith in their country has never wavered, and who despise the unworthy leaders who are inspired and directed from Washington and New York, to join with other patriotic citizens in defending the fair Dominion now threatened by a dangerous and treasonable movement.

There can be no doubt of the results for every indication during the past four years has gone to prove that the Ministry has held, and continues to hold, the absolute confidence of the people; for out of 53 by-elections 43 of them have been victories for the Government, and the latest instances in Montmorency, Napierville and South Victoria have afforded signal signs of a general satisfaction with the National Policy and the impregnability of the fortress. But notwithstanding these prepossessing indications, we urge upon every loyal Canadian, every friend of strong and able government, every staunch Conservative, every man with a stake in the community, to strain every nerve in behalf of a cause on whose success the most vital interests rest, and to make the general election of 1891 the most brilliant triumph for a Canadian policy that our political records have ever shown.

TOWN COUNCIL.

A NEW ELECTION IN WEST WARD.

The monthly meeting of the Town Council was held in Raitt's Hall, on Wednesday evening last. There being present, Mayor Smith and Couns. Lane, Fraser, Mitchell, Mouette, Riddle and Sec. Treas. Raitt. The minutes of former meeting being read were declared approved. The report of Presiding Officer Mr. Fraser, at municipal elections was read and received. A petition was read by the Secretary from Mr. Alex. Lamarche, one of the newly elected Couns., stating that as he had not the qualifications required by law to hold office, therefore he petitioned the council that his seat be declared vacant. Moved by Coun. Lane, Sec. by Coun. Mitchell, that Mr. Lamarche's petition be received and his seat declared vacant. Carried. Moved by Coun. Riddle, Sec. by Coun. Lane, that Monday Feb. 16th, be the day fixed for nomination. Coun. Fraser, to be presiding officer and to be held in the polling will take place on the following Monday, in West Ward. Carried. A letter was read from Mr. Gibb C. E.

stating that owing to the depth of snow it was impossible to measure the side walks built by O. B. Lafleur.

The curators of the estate of Kenneth & Boyes declined to accept the council's claim for a business tax as privileged. The Sec. Treas. presented the advice given by G. E. Hampton, who considered the claim privileged on inadmissible. This advice was accompanied by a bill of \$2, therefore.

A letter was read from the Manager of the Bell Telephone refusing to pay their tax. The council the use of a telephone as a remuneration for the tax. This offer the council refused and resolved to collect their tax.

The property appearing on the valuation roll under the name of Thomas Aiken, was changed to that of D. C. Miller and the property under Mrs. Airey's name was changed to that of Mrs. Thos. Todd.

A number of accounts were presented to the council and referred to the Finance Committee.

A letter was read from Mr. Henneker, solicitor of the C. P. R. agent Court House tax, agreeing to waive the right of prescription until the case was decided by the courts.

Moved by councillor Mitchell, seconded by councillor Riddle that councillor Lane be elected promotor. Carried. The following committee were appointed.

Mr. Simons appeared and said that in 1888 he had paid his Court House tax to Mr. Simpson, and got a receipt but had lost it. Now he was called upon to pay his tax, and he wished to be relieved from it.

The Mayor said that if there was no record on the books of his having paid the money and Mr. Simpson did not remember of having received it, he could do nothing.

Councillor Fraser introduced a by-law to amend by-law No. 36, increasing the tax on license certificates from \$3 to \$20. The council then adjourned.

ROAD INSPECTORS BEWARE!! A REIT ORDERED AGAINST OTHERS IN DANGER.

On Monday last the monthly meeting of the parish council was held in the Court House. There were present Mayor Dunbar, Coun. McQuat, G. Morrison, Smith, T. Morrison and the Sec. Treas. G. J. Walker Esq.

This being the first meeting after the general municipal elections, the newly elected councillors Dunbar and McQuat took the oath of office. The first business of the meeting was to elect a mayor. The re-election of councillor Dunbar was unanimous, and after the motion had been put by the Secretary-Treasurer, the newly elected mayor thanked the council for the renewal of their confidence. Numerous complaints had been laid before the officers of the council concerning the state of the winter roads and the neglect of duty exhibited by Road Inspectors. The Secretary stated that he had notified the Inspector on the Bethany Road, Mr. Wm. Hume, repeatedly and yet the milkmen coming into the town alleged that no attention had been paid to these warnings. Upon motion it was resolved to take out a suit against Inspector Hume, if the road was not put in repair within three days. Several other inspectors are on the list and unless they too attend to their duties immediate action will be instituted against them. The council decided that an enquiry be made, and are determined to enforce the law. There being no other business the council adjourned.
