MEETING OF CONSERVATIVES.

The death of Sir John A. Macdonald, the appointment of Hon. Mr. Abbott as Premier and the possibility of a provincial election at no distant date, are the reasons given for the calling of a mass-meeting of the conservatives of Argenteuil by Mr. Jas. Fish, President of the Conservative Association. The meeting will be held on Tuesday next, June 23rd at 2 p.m. in Olivet Hall, Lachute. Every member of the party is requested to attend.

THE NEW ACADEMY.

It is to be regretted that a large number of ratepayers did not attend the meeting held to hear the objections to the building of the new Academy. When the School Commissioners of a municipality contemplate the expenditure of \$10,000 for school buildings, it is not unreasonable that the ratepayers should be consulted on the matter. We are assured by the commissioners that had any person desired information or the calling of a meeting they were quite willing to call and attend one in order to give the fullest explanations. It would have been well if those who oppose the new building had requested such a meeting, before they formulated this objection to the action of the commissioners. After listening carefully to the objections put forth, and taking into consideration our personal knowledge of the circumstances, we believe those objections to be entirely unfounded. The position is as follows:—The department of education insists that better accommodation should be given the pupils attending the Academy. The attention of the School board has been called several times to this matter, in fact so often that the department finally decided that unless something was done the government grant of \$500 would be withheld. To postpone action therefore, according to the resolution of Mr. Creswell, would have been an actual loss of between \$100 and \$500. To raise this amount would have required a special tax, which in these hard times would materially increase our burdens, and result in what Mr. Creswell really was endeavoring to escape. In the face of these facts, therefore, to postpone proceedings for a year would be a most unwise, foolish and imprudent action.

The other phase of the question brought up by Mr. Meikle was more important and deserving of most careful consideration. Mr. Meikle evidently realized the situation clearly enough and saw that improved accommodation must be obtained immediately, but he raised the question, and a fair one it was, as to the advisability of enlarging the old building instead of erecting a new one. We must entirely dissent from that gentleman's views in regard to a play ground. He argued that Lachute being in the country, the children did not require a large play ground, as they had the fields and mountains to play and get fresh air, thus differing from children in the city who had not these advantages, and therefore large play grounds were essential to their welfare. In this view Mr. Meikle differs entirely from all our leading educators. A room may be just as badly ventilated, its air may be just as foul in the country as in the city. The question is, can a child remain in an over crowded building or even in a moderately filled building from 9 o'clock in the forenoon until four in the afternoon without that exercise which only a commodious play ground can conveniently give? Surely not. It matters not whether the school be in the city or country, a large play ground is required, as a matter of health, convenience and for the encouragement of those mainly sports which we at this age should be very loth to suppress. To spend three or four thousand dollars on an old building without the necessary grounds, situated so badly as to necessitate another school in the West End for the children there, would be simply a waste of money. Moreover, if hard times is the cry with which to conjure up opposition to the new building, this three thousand dollars must necessarily be raised by a direct tax, as the department will not allow school commissioners to borrow money to make repairs, and a tax sufficiently large to defray the cost of necessary repairs, would certainly cause some honest growling in these perpetual "hard times."

The opinion of experts is, that the old building is too far gone to repair or enlarge, and to do so would not in the interest of economy. The Commissioners, urged on by the department, are following the only wise course open to them and no doubt the few ratepayers opposing will see it in that light ere long.

The special correspondent at Ottawa of the "only religious daily," according to his own admission visited Hon. Mr. Abbott on Sunday to secure a newspaper interview. Surely this cannot be the Montreal Witness.

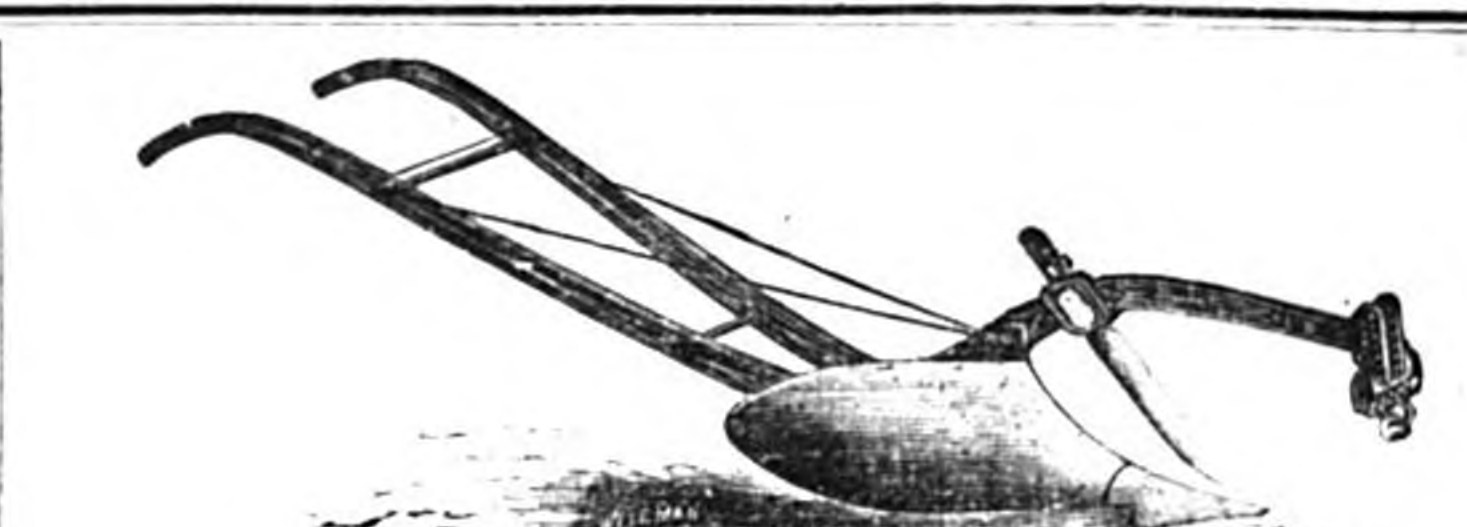
