A LIKELY (I) STORY.

Among the many foolish and absurd things that have appeared in the Montreal Star concerning Premier Abbott, the most nonsensical perhaps, is the one that Dr. Christie was about to be elevated to the Senate and that Mr. Abbott was to represent Argenteuil in the Commons. As a rider to that report the Star would make a good stroke by saying that Dr. Christie was to fill Mr. Abbott's place as government leader in the Upper House. In the first place it is not absolutely essential that Mr. Abbott should be in the Commons, and secondly if he considered it necessary to be there, there are several constituencies ready for him without removing a Liberal in that manner. It is generally admitted, however, that the premier would rather represent his old constituency than any other, which is not unnatural, but in order to open the seat for Argenteuil it is not necessary to raise Dr. Christie to the Senate. There is that little investigation at St. Scholastique to come off yet, and while it might be a little more comfortable for our federal member and especially his friends, to obviate the necessity of answering many serious questions that may be asked, yet, the interesting feature of the election trial are not likely to be blotted out by the elevation of Dr. Christie to the Senate.

## THE PROHIBITION QUESTION.

The manly and conscientious stand taken by the Hon. Mr. Foster in his address on the Jameson resolutions has done much to elevate him in the eyes of the sensible portion of the temperance community. We say "sensible" portion, for unfortunately the temperance cause, like every other good cause, has its friends, who through want of judgment or something else, are in reality retarding the cause instead of aiding it. Ever since Mr. Foster has been in public life, and by his abilities and hard work has been advancing by rapid strides to be one of the first statesmen of Canada, there have been men—temperance men if you will—who have never been guilty of allowing an opportunity to pass without endeavoring to cast a slur on his name and insinuate that for the sake of gain, he had gone back on the principles of temperance, he once held so dear. He has been maligned, slandered, misrepresented, and all for a political purpose. Nevertheless there is no uncertain sound about his position. He is as strong a believer in prohibition to-day as ever. But common sense, experience and good judgment teaches him that a resolution involving the wiping out of over \$7,000,000 of revenue, the closing up and legislating out of existence millions of capital now engaged in the manufacture of liquors, the taking away of a great source of revenue from our provincial governments, the closing up of thousands of places of business, cannot be entered upon lightly, and must be supported by the overwhelming voice of the people not only at the polls but by their moral influence. Not that these difficulties are insurmountable, but that they are serious difficulties and should be got over with as little friction as possible. Is there a man or woman in Canada, thoroughly acquainted with the public sentiment of the different provinces who will pretend for one moment that the majority of the people are in favor of prohibition, or are sufficiently impressed with the need of it to give that moral support required for the proper enforcement of any law? Are the people educated on this question? Do they know any of the information the obtaining of which has been left to a Royal Commission? Yet this is what the Jameson resolution declared, and while it must be admitted that many voted honestly for the resolution, there were many who did not believe the country was ready for prohibition, who knew perfectly well that the passing of those resolutions and the springing of the government of a prohibitory liquor law upon the country would throw the cause back a quarter of a century. And yet party feeling, or fear of the W. C. T. U., or perchance the Montreal Witness who pocketed their convictions, their consciences and voted straight.

There have been men mean enough and newspapers low enough to refer to the fact that Mr. Foster at one time was poor and accepted \$10 per night as a lecturer. They might have gone further back and stated that not many years ago our Finance Minister sold tea, sugar and soap in a small grocery not as proprietor but as "the boy." More honest to him for that fact. Such a career as his is an inspiration to hundreds of our Canadian youth. As long as the temperance question is used in the Dominion as it was in the election in Argenteuil, it is a political football the prohibition will remain far in the distance.

What I Saw and Heard at the Camp Meeting!

To the Editor of THE WATCHMAN.

On the afternoon of last Lord's Day, I went to the Camp Meeting, solely for the purpose of holding Christian fellowship with those who profess faith in the meek and lowly Jesus. But I regret to state that instead of hearing the Gospel preached, to perishing souls who were there in large numbers, Mr. Homer gave a lengthy discourse from numbers 13-30, "Let us go up at once." The preacher made Caleb and Joshua (the Israelites) to represent the wholly sanctified Christians, while the ten false prophets or those who had no faith in God's promise represented unsanctified Christians. From the truth of God I can find no such doctrine as an unsanctified Christian. I, Cor. 1-30. There was nothing in Mr. Homer's discourse about the blood of Jesus Christ, nothing in fact likely to lead any one there to the Savior of sinners.

At the close of the service, Mr. Homer invited all who desired the second blessing, sanctification (or holiness) to come forward to the penitent bench. Quite a number went, and kneeling there began to pray, or rather to scream and shout. What they were saying, I cannot tell, the confusion was so great among them. Some were rolling on the ground beating the earth with their fists and kicking with their feet, calling out "glory to God," others were moving about calling to the Holy Ghost to come down. Women were laying backward on the ground, order was out of question. Some were praying one thing and some another. The preacher attempted an excuse for such a wild scene by saying it was no worse than what he had seen of some receiving the Lord's Supper, and getting drunk through the week. I returned to the Camp Meeting on Monday afternoon and evening to assure myself as a Christian if I could get anything which would spiritually benefit me, but to my regret I found the same wild scenes repeated, and still more repulsive. One woman was moving about with her eyes closed, her hat hanging down at the side of her head. Some one requested her to put on her hat, but she called out "I don't care I am dead to the world glory to God." All this time the preacher was standing up with a small cap on his head looking on and laughing at the scene before him.

A few passages of Scripture occurred to my mind at the time which are certainly in a striking contrast to the scene referred to. See I Cor 14-44, "Let all things be done decently and in order" 33 ver. "God is not the author of confusions or (tumult) but of peace as in all the churches of the Saints." As for the praying for the Holy Ghost to come down, the Word of God assures us that the Holy Ghost has already come. To keep praying that the Holy Ghost may come down is a denial of His presence. See John 16-8-14. My mind was led to the time in Carmel where the prophets of Baal 450 called aloud from morning until evening "Oh Baal hear us!" But there was not a voice or any that answered. I Kings, 18: 26-27-28.

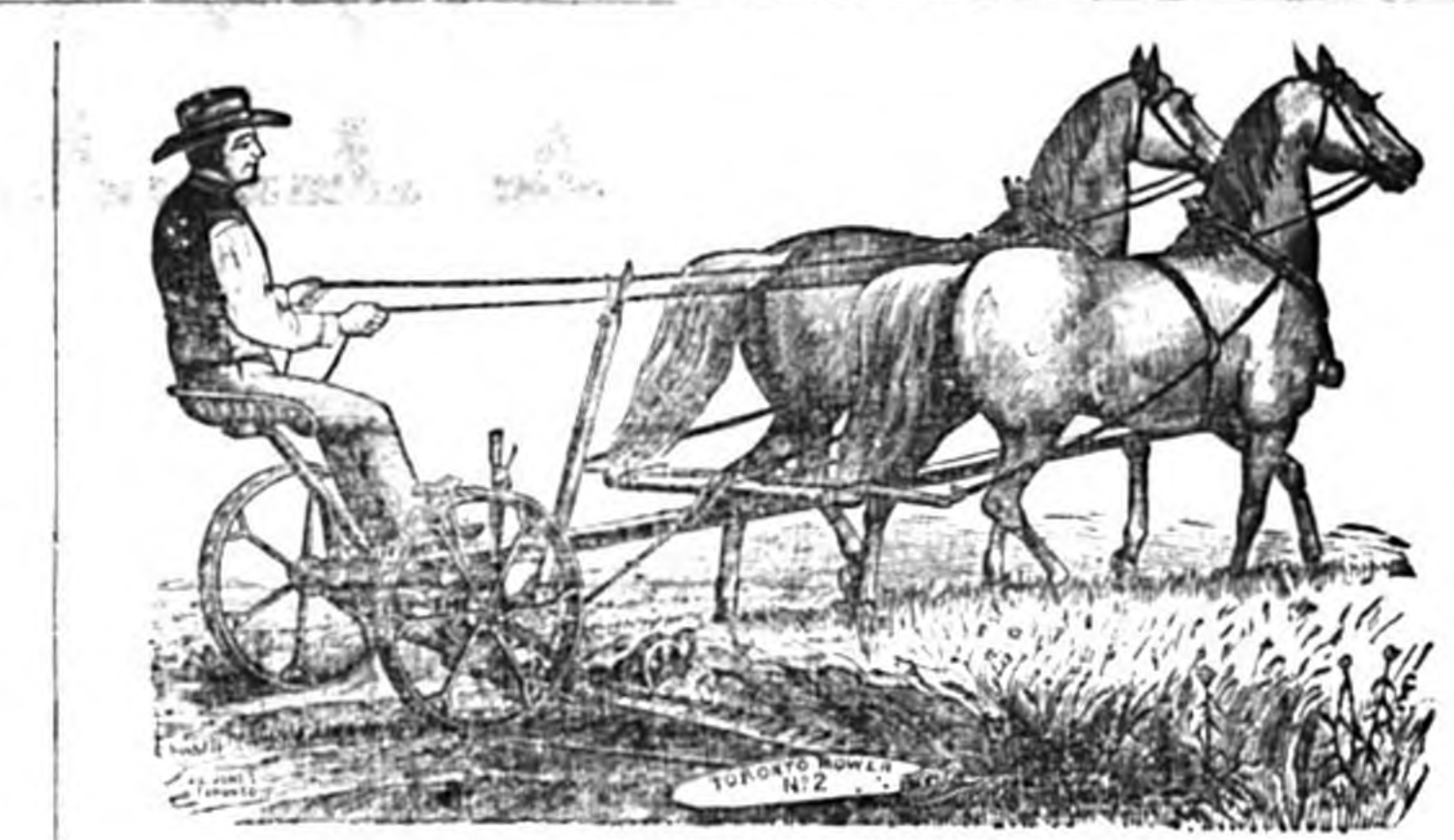
